C.N.R. OF RIGHT OF WAY INTO STRATHCONA

Thought that the New Railway Will Enter the University City East of the Right of Way of the Canadian Northern.

The question of the Canadian Northern right of way into Strathcona has been much discussed during the past few days and it is probable that a definite answer will be made as to the right of way in the course of a short time.

The Canadian Northern line which will enter the city within the next year will come in to the east side of the C. & N. E. and will tap the main line at one or two blocks east of the present railway crossing. If such be the case it is probable that a large station will be erected near the corner of Whyte Avenue and Third street east and the line will then angle through the block towards the C.P.R. right of way, leading to the high level bridge.

The purchasing agent of the Canadian Northern, Mr. J. T. Stirling, formerly deputy in the Strathcona bridge district, takes charge in The Pass and A. R. Wilson, recently appointed, has the Lethbridge district.
