The British Election.

The figures appended should prove of interest. They represent the British poll. It will be seen that the Nationalists and Laborites have each increased their membership by three, whilst the Liberals have lost three, the Unionists one and the Independent Nationalists one. As there were a large number of unopposed returns particularly among the Unionists and the Nationalists, the total number of votes cast does not show the strength of these parties. Unionists 272. Liberals 371. Laborites 243. Nationalists 214. Independent Nationalists 10. Coalition majority 128. The composition of the last Parliament was as follows: Laborites 275. Unionists 273. Nationalists 211. Independent Nationalists 11. Coalition majority 124. The total number of votes cast was 8,229,073, distributed as follows: Unionists 2,415,280. Liberals 2,293,894. Laborites 882,158. Redmondites 84,470. O'Brienites 95,529. Miscellaneous 2,343.

Cable News.

Special Evening Telegram. LONDON, Dec. 26. James Bryce, British Ambassador to the United States, and Mrs. Bryce, sailed for New York on the Cedric. SAN DOMINGO, Dec. 26. The Dominican Government is moving troops to frontiers. This action is explained officially as due to the fact that Haiti has placed soldiers on the border line between San Domingo and Haiti. Diplomatic negotiations, however, continue between the Republics. The Government is confident that a reference of the boundary dispute to arbitration is necessary.

Special Evening Telegram. LONDON, Dec. 26. Another striking example of the dangers to which unarmed London policemen are exposed in pursuing burglars occurred to-day, when Policeman Haytred was fired at 4 times while chasing a robber. When the policeman grappled with the thief, the lawbreaker the latter pressed the muzzle of his revolver to the policeman's forehead and pulled the trigger. The cartridge became jammed and failed to explode saving the policeman's life.

Special Evening Telegram. PEKIN, Dec. 26. The Throne has met the situation arising from the almost rebellious attitude of the national assembly with firmness and tact. Its refusal to create immediately a ministry responsible to the Assembly and to convolve forthwith a general parliament was followed by the issuance yesterday of an edict which though peculiarly non-committal is interpreted as a call to the people to prepare for a programme providing ultimately for the establishment of a constitutional cabinet. This is accepted by the Progressives as an imperial pledge that their demands will be granted eventually and it also afforded the more bellicose delegates an opportunity to recognize the national action of Saturday when the National Assembly adopted a memorial defining the right of the Throne to reject their demands bitterly assailing Prince Ching, one of the most powerful of the Grand Councilors. To-day the Assembly voted to withhold the memorial in view of Sunday's edict. It is suspected, however, that the members were privately warned that the Assembly would be dissolved if the Throne, another Government edict issued yesterday, authorized Prince Ching, declaring that his long experience has made him most valuable to the Empire in the present crisis and declines his resignation, to do so the second time because of the Assembly's attacks upon him. The Government appears to have won the immediate issue but the fight with the Throne yields in due season.

A Lunatic Captured. An unfortunate young man named Alan Rhodes of Waterford Road, who was in the Lunatic Asylum before, became violently insane at his residence this morning, and the report went round that he had locked himself in his room with an axe in his possession. Sergt. Savage with Const. O'Flaherty and Tobin proceeded to the place found that the man though demoted was quiet, so that he was easily managed and they brought him to the Asylum. He was not armed with an axe as reported.

Thought 'Twas Missing Woman. Peter Neville in passing through Topsail Road last night met a woman who came out of the woods and who seemed to be in a dazed condition. She had neither hat nor coat on and when questioned she gave her name as Noseworthy. As it was imagined that the woman was Thistle, now missing, the matter was reported to the police to-day and they discovered that the woman met by Neville was Noseworthy of Murphy's Square and that she had returned home all right though she endured much hardship, as she had been hours in the woods.
