PARIS, via St. Pierre, March 30. In Ypres region the French exploded, by dynamite, a German observa tion post. At Esparges the Germans tried to re-capture trenches lost or 27th March. After violent fighting we have retained all the ground pre viously gained. The Germans tool footing in some sections of their old trenches, but in compensation the French progressed on other new points.

The enemy bombarded Nieupor and Nieuport Les Bains, but the damage done to the bridge thrown across on the Yser, were of little im portance. In Champagne an artillery duel took place in Beausejour neighborhood. In Argonne there has been cannonading and troops used hand grenades, especially in Bagatelle region, where great activity was shown on both sides. Elsewhere a calm day no infantry fighting.

Four hours later a undred joyous German jackies were eady to stow away a vast quantity pigs, beer, cheese, and butter in e Kaiser's larder at Zeebrugge. Intead of sinking or scuttling the capured ships the Germans are now conscating the cargoes. At the same pier another hundred jackies were rforming a similar operation on the utch steamer Zaanstrom Amsterdam or London. On the promenade deck each vessel a long line of bewildred passengers, a motley crowd of ench, Dutch Belgians, and Amerians handed over passports, and other nvincing papers they possessed, to German commander and staff. It vas a big day in Zeebrugge. The two cung lieutenants who brought the prizes to port stood grinning at the proceedings from the shelter of high range finder. Submarines and their tenders rolled languidly by. An occasional taube appeared out of the mist to purr over the appetizing specacle of pork and beer. Naval and army officers whizzed up to the ships powerful military automobiles and congratulated the men who turned the rick, also to cast longing glances at he pork. The submarine which captured the Batavier V. the U-36, was of the largest type. She piloted the vessel to Zeebrugge through the vater thickly strewn with mines.
