THE GERMAN FAIRY TALE.

BERLIN, To-day An official regarding the air raid on England reads:—On the night of September 23rd and 24th several squatrons of naval air ships extensively bombed London and places of military importance on the Humber and middle Counties over which were Notdle Counties, among which were Not-tingham and Sheffield. Success was everywhere visible from the heavy conflagration which could be seen for configration which could be seen for a long while. The airships when approaching England before crossing the English Coast were shelled by patrol boats during the attacks and by defensive batteries which used incendiary projectiles. The airships silenced some batteries by a well directed volley. Two airships fell victims to fire around London, all the others returned.

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PROGRESS AT FLORINA.

LONDON, To-day.

A despatch to Reuters from Saloniki dated Sunday says the Entente began at 7 o'clock this morning a vigorous offensive on the extreme westward and northward of Florina There was fighting all day long. ANOTHER RAID.

LONDON, To-day. Several hostile airships crossed the east and north east coasts England between 10.30 and midnight, says an official statement issued shortly after midnight. Bombs are reported to have been dropped in several places in the northern and north-midland Counties. One airship was also reported off the south coast. No reports of casualties or damage have yet been received.

LONDON, To-day. BERLIN, To-day. Newspapers appear to accept philo-ophically the loss of two Zeppelins sophically the loss of two Zeppelins in the raid on England. LONDON BUDGET.

Attacking simultaneously on an area of 15 miles running from Martinpuich to the Somme the British and French forces delivered another smashing blow on the German lines and pushed on in an area of fifteen miles running from Martinpuich to the Somme. From Martinpuich to Combles, a distance of six miles, the British have driven their wedge to a depth of more than a mile and captured in the attack the important strategic towns of Lesboeufs and Morval. The French town of Rancourt, two miles east of the outskirts of Freigcourt, which is one mile north east of Combles, in addition to trenches near Frogcourt, in the vicinity of Bouchavesnes and to the south from the vicinity of the Canal of Dunford to the Somme were taken. The capture of Morval by the British and part of Fregicourt by he French apparently seals the fate of Combles which the Germans have stolidly held for weeks, despite the violent attacks thrown against it. ATHENS, To-Day.

A despatch to the Morning Chron-A despatch to the Morning Chron-icle says that the Venizelos procla-mation will provide the last opportu-nity for King Constantine to place himself and his Government in line with the wishes of the majority of the Greek people who do not want any declaration of dethronement of the monarch. The despatch says that Venizelos will call for a general mobilization through the Island of Crete for the purpose of national defence. He will then visit Mitylene, Chies and Sames before proceeding to Saloniki. Leonidas Emberices, own-er of the National Steam Navigation Company, and reputed to be the richest man in Greece, is reported to have informed Admiral Condourictis of his intentions to place his whole fortune at the disposal of the national defence movement. Before leaving Athens, Admiral Condourious offered the King his resignation as Royal Aide de Camp.
