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

The Far Flung Line.

(From the New York Times.) From the English Channel to the Jordan the whole battlefront rages, and all along it rings the note of victory. Only on the Italian front is there no great operation under way, and we know enough of the campaign by now to be sure that front is waiting orders. It is that the Bulgarian defeat is thing to unleash that front. Never was such a far-flung battle in the history of the world; a battle that begins in Belgium reaches to Palestine, practically to the Persian Gulf, and the British dash forward to reach their homes. Jewish troops help back their ancestral places. The battle begins in the flat lands of the east of France, dips down to the mountain ridges and turns south to the border of the Syrian desert, which tattered remnants of the

destroyed Turkish armies are fleeing. Victory everywhere; everywhere "the sons of night, astonished after short triumph, do recoil;" the sons of night "flying at them, with the tempest of cat-o'-mountain, or demon incarnate; which no son of night can stand!" And even this is not all, for there are other battlelines. There is a battleline in North Russia, where the German-paid troops of the Bolsheviks are being driven back, and one in Siberia, where the Germans themselves and their Bolshevik allies are being forced across a continent. But the eyes of the world are not fixed there, but on the one great battleline that runs from Flanders southeast to the Plain of Armageddon. British cavalry scoured that plain the other day, driving back the Turks; this more than continental battle would not have been dramatically won but for the feature left out.

Victory Through Sacrifice.

A British officer recently stood before a great meeting of American bankers in Minneapolis and warned them, not against the pessimists but against "the optimists who, since the United States entered the war, are too much inclined to think it is all over but the shouting." "There are," said the British officer, "days of great slaughter before the day of great shouting, and tens of thousands, perhaps hundreds of thousands of gallant men must go down, down to the Valley of the Shadow, ere the day of victory dawns. It is a blood-red pathway that leads to the final triumph."

The Minneapolis Bankers' Association thought so highly of this speech, and were so impressed that Americans everywhere would be steadied by it, they had it reprinted in pamphlet form for general distribution. The British officer who delivered it was Captain Frank Edwards of the Royal Fusiliers, a South African veteran who has served for four years in the present war, and who passed through the furious fighting during the German offensive of this year. He is one of the several officers sent from England at the request of the United States to assist in a campaign of war publicity. Capt. Edwards impressed upon his audience that the only road to victory lies through sacrifice, and that American sacrifices must be great before a durable peace can be conquered. He told them something of Britain's sacrifices, saying:

"I know that there still is, especially among your young people, there is still something for you about war, something of glamor, something of halo, something of romance, and of adventure. Ah, but in England for us that has passed, never to return; we have drunk the cup of bitterness to the dregs."

"During the Cambrai fight I came to England three times in ten days and once I had to take back 2,000 men to stop the breach. I marched those 2,000 men through one of our southern ports on a Sunday morning. The people were standing along the streets, there were thousands there, but I marched silent men through silent streets, the street was as silent as you are this morning. There were 2,000 men going over it, but they knew they were going to die. . . . Men marching in silence, men going to die—we drank the cup of bitterness to the dregs. There is no glamor, no halo, no romance about war for England to-day."

"He told them that he never set down to a meal in the United States without a feeling of sadness. The plentiful fare caused him to recall with pain conditions in England. Often he found on his plate at one meal more meat than his wife and three children at home in England could possibly hope to have in a whole week. "You don't know war yet, America!" he cried. And he continued:

"A man asked me the other day, there were a large number of bankers gathered together: 'Have you ever seen so many bankers together before in one room. . . . gentlemen I have seen many more bankers than this, assembled together, British bankers. Where? I will tell you—on the fields of France marching into action. . . . I have seen a battalion of a thousand men marching into action to fight and to die, and every man a banker.'

"You don't know what it has cost us in man power. A man said to me the other day in America: 'You know since we have come into this war we are going to show the world what we can do, and this American nation is going to startle the world in this war. If needs be we are going to put into the fields of France five millions of men! Five-million men! You know I could not help looking him in the eyes and asking him if he had forgotten what's colossal campaign this is, and whether it was not too late to expect to stagger the world by putting five million men in the field to-day.' I said: 'Look here, my friend, you know that in the first two years of war England by voluntary enlistment without conscription of any kind had brought five million men to the colors, and at the end of 1917 we had placed in the field in France—in the field—an army of six million men.' And I said: 'you understand what that means to England? Six million men out of a population of forty-two millions that is one man in seven of the whole of her population, old people, women and children.'"

He followed his moving story of British sacrifices with similar facts about the terrific losses which the French have sustained without any weakening of their national spirit or any slackening of their resolution to win final victory. And he finished with this final word about patriotism and war profits:


"I know a man can make profits at this period as honestly as he can at any period of the world's history. But there is one strange and sad quality attached to all the profits you make to-day and this is it. All your profits made to-day are blood-bought. That is the message that I leave with you from the line—all your profits are blood-bought. They are bought with the blood of lives. Is it right that one man should give his son to die that another man should selfishly grow rich in the shelter of the first man's sacri-

fic. Is it right America? . . . Put your patriotism before your profits, play the game."

**Household Notes**

Yeast cakes kill rats and mice, if it is said, if left where they can eat them. When mashed potatoes are served with gravy don't put any butter in them. When placing a dish on ice put a fruit jar rubber under it to hold it steady. Save all the seed you can this fall, as it will be very high next spring. Use a spatula to scrape every vent of food from the cooking utensils. To keep onions successfully, place between layers of straw in a cool place. If honey comes granulated, place in a pan of hot water or a double boiler. Pie crust which contains wheat substitute does not have to be chilled before baking.
