WHAT IS YOUR FURNITURE WORTH

Did you ever make an inventory of your household goods? If you never did I think you would find it an interesting and eye opening exercise. Theoretically everyone is supposed to do that before putting a value on their furniture and clothing for insurance. Actually, I think, the majority of people name some lump sum which sounds fairly large to them and let it go at that.

What a surprise most of them would have if their houses should burn down (fortunately such complete losses are very rare) and they should start replacing what they had lost.

Double What I Had Thought Adequate Insurance.

Having occasion to shift some insurance to a summer camp and having previously insured only in the haphazard manner, I decided to take a pencil and go about the house figuring out what it would really cost me to replace furniture, clothes, jewelry, etc., in case of a complete loss. When I had finally gotten my figures down and added them up I stared at them in amazement and then added again. But I had been right the first time. The total was more than double what I had thought was a generous insurance. Moreover I had deliberately left out some things which I would not want to replace and had made the values low on others. Furthermore, in the days that followed I kept discovering things that had been unintentionally left out, my bag and suit case, my trunk, a clothes' basket, (once such a humble thing that one would not bother to count it at all but nowadays there is practically nothing that is humble in price) the bathroom mirror, etc., etc.

Most People Are Vague in Their Estimates.

Since that experience I have inquired from several people about

their insurance, and find the same vagueness and habit of underrating. I asked a woman who has a ten-room house, well furnished throughout what she had her furniture insured for. She said, "Two thousand dollars."

"It would come a good deal nearer six," I said. She laughed at me but when we fell to reckoning she stopped laughing. In her dining room, living room and kitchen alone (that took in silver and china of course) she soon had over two thousand dollars.

Take Just Blankets and Sheets.

The replacement value of such unconsidered items as sheet and pillow cases and blankets is simply enormous. Blankets and sheets in my simple summer camp could not be replaced under fifty dollars. Think what they would be in a large house.

"I wouldn't have believed we had spent all that money on our house. It's being done so gradually, I suppose, I haven't noticed it," said the woman with the inadequate two thousand dollars of insurance.

That is another interesting thing about such an inventory. It shows one where some of one's money has gone. Of course, that doesn't bring back any of it but it is interesting.

Take a block of paper and well sharpened pencil and try it some evening.

Incidentally the possession of such an inventory would make adjusting your insurance a much simpler thing if fire ever did come to your house.

Belgium Honors Her Edith Cavell.

The transfer of the body of Gabrielle Petit, a young Belgium woman, whom the Germans executed on a charge of treason, was carried out at Brussels on May 29, with impressive ceremonies. The streets were lined with thousands of spectators, and the city had the appearance of national mourning. Piles of flowers covered the coffin, and troops, patriotic societies and school children followed the cortege to the communal cemetery, where military honours were paid. Premier De La Croix, and other officials delivered eulogies before the coffin left the Town Hall for Schaerbeek, a suburb. Mile. Petit was put to death in 1916.

Grenades as Banks for Pennies.

Millions of hand grenades, manufactured for use against the German army by the allied fighting units, will be used to encourage thrift among the school children of the United States. These hand grenades, transformed into banks to hold the pennies and dimes which the school children are saving to buy thrift stamps and war saving stamps, will be distributed by the savings division directors of the twelve Federal Reserve Bank districts. The hand grenades are the highest development of the modern hand-to-hand fighting weapon. When the armistice was signed the War Department had on hand fifteen million of these grenades, ready to be loaded with explosives for shipment.

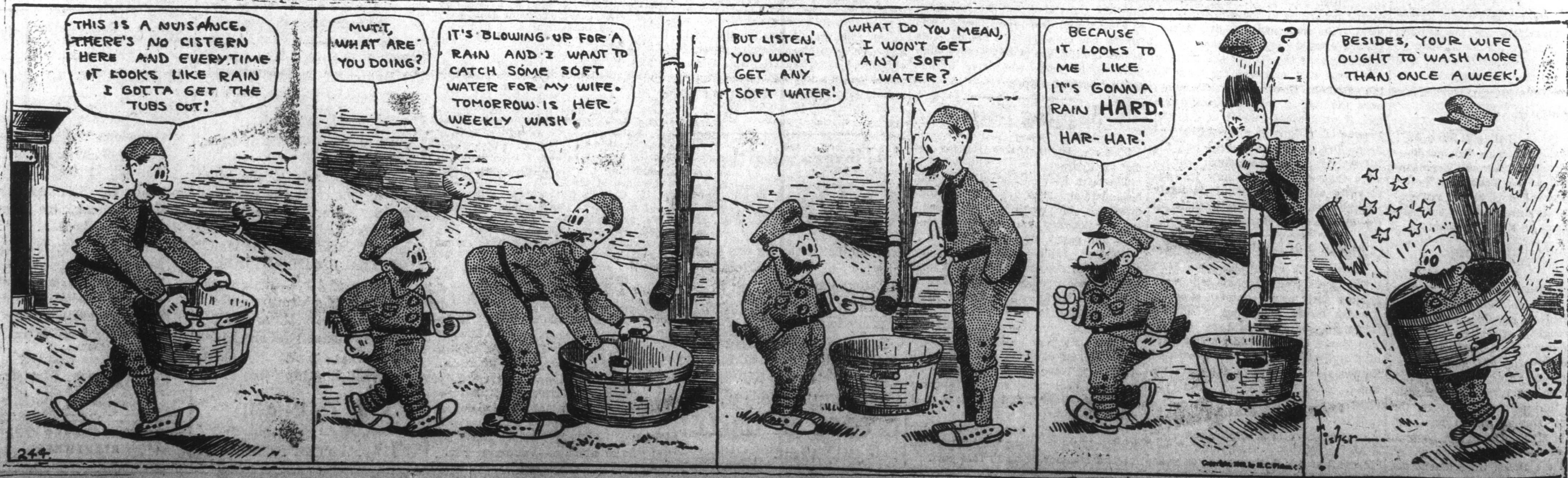
