Seen From the Lobby.

House of Assembly, April 23.
Major Sullivan, member for Placentia and St. Mary's, in criticizing the Speech from the Throne, was particularly, if unconsciously, rich in humor and wit. At mention of "Prohibition" the spectators laughed; but although they were quick to laugh, I noticed they did not once applaud.

Different Assemblymen employ different methods of passing the time during which they are in the House, ostensibly, to legislate and make laws. Some read the papers. A couple, I noticed, had a bag of candy and furtively slipped sweets into their mouths, using their handkerchiefs to conceal their action. A couple of members spent their afternoon telling funny stories to each other. One honourable Minister spends a lot of his time writing contributions for a certain daily newspaper.

This latter case reminds me of a story of a certain Judge of the Central District Court, now dead. His Honor was an inveterate contributor to local newspapers and magazines, and he used often to employ his time, while on the bench, with writing such contributions.

Major Sullivan, touching on agriculture and forestry matters, gave some very interesting facts concerning reforestation. While in Scotland with the Forestry Battalion, he said he saw a small area of woods—about three-quarters of a mile—which had been reforested. This area was sold to the British Government for £45,000. He had not believed in reforestation until he went to Scotland, but is now certainly a warm advocate of it. A square of woods, in this country, is \$1,000,000. With reforestation, it would be worth \$18,000,000.

In this connection I might mention that in Norway a sapling has to be planted for every tree cut down. In other countries—a man must plant a certain number of young trees when he gets married, and additional trees for each child. In Canada, I understand, it is illegal to cut trees in order to reach the ones desired.

Mr. Phil. Moore's wit was thoroughly appreciated by the auditors. This was the first time that I had heard Mr. Moore, and I was not disappointed in him. His remarks about the filling of Government jobs by civilians instead of returned soldiers, were very poignant and cutting. Certain young members on the Government benches had an uncomfortable few minutes of it.

Mr. N. J. Vinnicombe's maiden speech in the Assembly, did him much credit and gave proof that as time goes on and he gathers parliamentary experience, he will rank in the category of straightforward, convincing, sincere and logical speakers, and thus will be of great assistance to his party in carrying on details.

The poor new Government did not get a look in for the whole afternoon and evening, and before the session was over several of them left in a body, feeling, no doubt, that they had little business there.

One fell asleep—or seemed to be. His head was thrown back on the back of his chair and flies—if there had been any—could have used the open door as easily as winking. A beautiful view of his teeth, throat and interior was presented.
