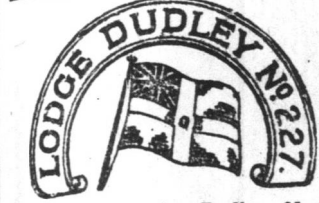

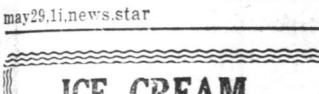

House of Assembly.

FRIDAY, May 28.

The House met at 3 p.m.

Mr. Gosse (Hr. Grace), presented a petition asking for Modification of the Prohibition Act.

Mr. Sullivan (Placentia and St. Mary's), presented a petition asking for a road.

QUESTIONS.

Mr. Bennett asked the Hon. Colonial Secretary in the absence of the Minister of Militia to lay on the Table of the House a statement of all monies paid through the Militia Department to the Board of Review on Separation Allowances from the 15th November, 1919, to the present date, giving the names of those comprising said Board and the amount paid to each member, also number of claims considered during the above period.

The reply to the above question was given verbally, and in the absence of Mr. Bennett, Sir Michael Cashin asked for it in writing. The Board consists of Hon. R. A. Squires, Col. Rendell, and Maj. Howley, who are each drawing fifty dollars a month for their services thereon.

ORDER OF THE DAY:

The Legislative Council's amendments to the Standardization of Fish Bill were accepted.

The "Debiture Bonds" and "Exportation of Salt Codfish" Bills were given a third reading, and the "Business Profits Tax" Bill and "Montreal Trust Co." Bill passed the committee stage.

Hon. W. F. Coaker moved the second reading of the Bill respecting Beavers. This provides that beavers, the killing of which had, for some years been banned, would be open for hunting in certain areas, under the supervision of the Game Board.

Messrs. Small, MacDonnell, Scammell, Warren and Sullivan spoke to the measure, all in support.

Sir John Crosbie (Port de Grave), brought up the matter of salt and wished to ask the Prime Minister if anything had been done. (The Prime Minister here replied that the High Commissioner had been wired.) A new situation had arisen since yesterday—salt had gone up to \$6 a hhd. He wanted to know why salt had advanced \$2.30 since Wednesday. This salt was imported months ago and was selling for \$3.70 and \$4. Where was the profiteering Act which was passed some time ago?

Sir John asked, also, what had been done to relieve the coal situation. Was the Government aware that coal had gone to \$20.80 per ton to-day? Steamers and schooners were being detained in Sydney, waiting for coal. One schooner, in particular, had been there for twenty-one days. Both the salt and the coal situation demanded the immediate attention of the Government.

Messrs. Halfyard and Coaker replied to Sir John Crosbie, pointing out that it was his duty to help rather than to criticize the Government. Mr. Coaker claimed that both salt and coal had been receiving the attention of the government for months past. He said the same arrangements were made with the salt importers as were made by the late Government in 1919 as regards importations and prices and if Sir John would privately give him the names of the parties he would make them live up to their agreement with the Government and refund the money overcharged. The salt importers had met him this week and it was only then they put the situation before him. They had all the negotiations themselves before that. He further stated that the British Ambassador at Madrid and the British Consul at Cadiz had been advised to have the steamers now in Cadiz loaded at all costs, and the Newfoundland Government would pay the bill. He hoped for results from this.

Mr. W. J. Walsh (Placentia and St. Mary's), backed Sir John Crosbie in everything he had said. Sir John deserved the gratitude of the whole country for bringing the all-important matters of salt and coal before the attention of the Government.

The House adjourned until Monday.

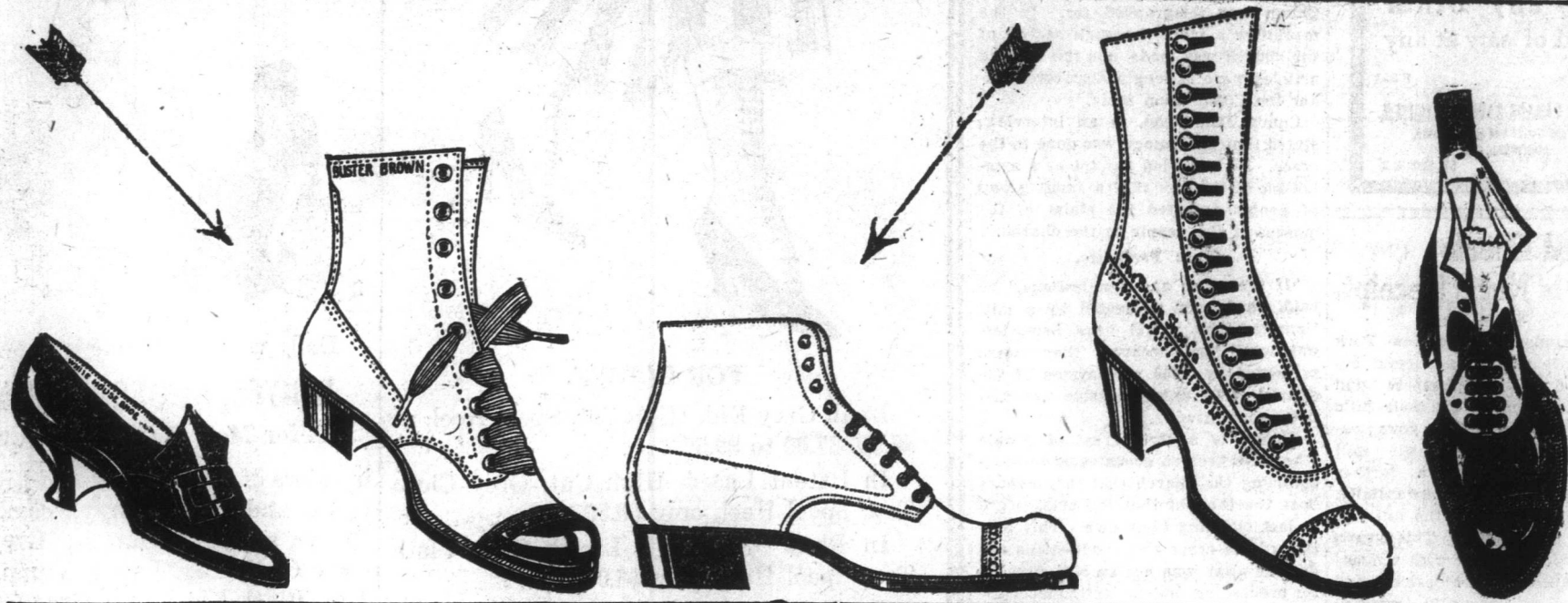
