### To-Day's Messages.

#### ON SIXTIETH DAY.

LONDON, Oct. 11. MacSweeney's condition on the sixtieth day of his hunger strike is said to be virtually the same as yesterday.

#### SPONTANEOUS WELCOME HOME.

LONDON, Oct. 11. The Prince of Wales made a triumphant entry into London to-day on his return from a six months tour of the Empire. Hundreds of thousands turned out to give the Prince one of the greatest welcomes of his kind ever given in the history of the country.

#### SCHOONER RACE STARTS.

HALIFAX, Oct. 11. Nine fishing schooners of the Lunenburg county fleet started in the forty mile ocean race, for a purse of five thousand dollars and a silver cup, emblematic of the championship of Nova Scotian waters here, this morning.

#### TERRIBLE RAILWAY ACCIDENTS.

PARIS, Oct. 10. Forty-two persons were killed and a hundred injured yesterday, when the Paris-Nantes express ran into a freight. The accident occurred about four miles from Maisons Laftite at the Paris suburban station of Houllotte. Most of the victims were work-

men returning from their labor, and identity of many of them will never be known, as they were badly mangled. Some thirty persons were injured when a passenger train, travelling from Paris for Angoulême, collided at Amers with another train.

#### OUTWITTED THE STRIKERS.

TILBURY, England, Oct. 10. The steamer Minnekahda, the crew of which on Saturday refused to take the vessel to New York unless arrangements were made for the return of the men to England, sailed to-day. A new crew evaded the strikers during the night, got aboard the Minnekahda and took her to sea.

#### LECKIE LOST HIS BEARINGS.

WINNIPEG, Oct. 10. Colonel Leckie, on the trans-Canada flight, got out of his bearings on the way to Winnipeg to-night. He landed at Selkirk at 7.40 and will come to the city by the urban street car to-night.

#### POLES OCCUPY VILNA.

LONDON, Oct. 10. Polish forces occupied Vilna, the Lithuanian capital, Saturday afternoon, but details are lacking, says the Kovno correspondent of the London Times to-day. There is an exodus of the native population of Vilna, the correspondent adds.

#### WILL BE SIGNED TO-NIGHT.

RIGA, Oct. 11. Polish and Bolshevik delegates engaged in negotiations here, will sign an armistice agreement at Brockhead House at seven o'clock to-night, and hostilities will cease six days after signing. The convention armistice will run for twenty-five days, and forty-eight hours' notice will be necessary before either side can legally break it.

#### FLOODS IN FRANCE.

PARIS, Oct. 11. Torrential rains in almost all parts of France have sent the rivers beyond their banks and have resulted in heavy property damage. The Garonne and Tarn overflowed, and reports state that many domestic animals and much other property were destroyed.

#### DENIES OCCUPATION.

PARIS, Oct. 11. The Polish Government disavows the occupation of Vilna by Gen. Zeligowski and his troops, according to advices received by the Foreign Office here this morning.

#### Salvage Ship Arrives.

S.S. BASAN BROUGHT TO PORT. S.S. Daisy left here for Trepassy at 11 o'clock Saturday night where in conjunction with the s.s. Portia she took in tow the s.s. Basan, the three ships leaving Trepassy yesterday at 3 p.m. The weather all the way proved very stormy and only by the most careful navigation on the part of Capt. Couch and Connors did the ships make port. Several times on the way along the tow lines of both ships gave way. However port was safely reached this forenoon and the Basan was left at anchorage near the King's Wharf.

### Obituary.

#### EX-PRIVATE JAMES McGRATH.

There passed away at his parents' home, Central Street, on Friday morning last, Ex-Private James McGrath. Deceased was amongst the first to join when the call for Overseas came and he saw quite a lot of active service being severely wounded in the "1st of July drive." He was invalided home about a year before the armistice, and for a time he was engaged cab driving on the West End stand until illness forced him to abandon all work. Everything that medical skill could do was availed of but all to no purpose, and on Friday last he passed peacefully to the great beyond. Surviving are father and mother, five sisters and five brothers to whom the Telegram express sincere sympathy. Interment took place yesterday afternoon, the funeral being one of the largest seen in the city for some time, a contingent of cabs from the West End stand closing the procession.

### Great Value of Labrador

London, Ont., Oct. 6.—That Labrador is a portion of Canada, that going to prove of immense value to the Dominion, was the declaration at the Masonic Temple here last night, of Dr. Wilfred T. Grenfell, famous Labrador missionary, and medical man, in inaugurating a campaign for funds in support of his humanitarian work.

More hospitals are needed for the sick and money is needed in order to equip these, declared Mr. Grenfell. Dr. H. L. Paddon, assistant to Dr. Grenfell, said that one of the greatest scandals in Labrador is that pulp lands are held up.

"This would not be the case if we had a representative in Parliament," he declared.

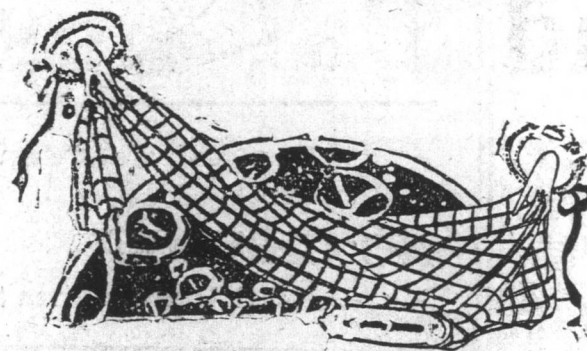
