## Smuts Has Audience With King George.

### Favorable Prospects of Irish Settlement--Democrats Denounce Republican Tariff Bill.

**IRISH OUTLOOK STILL HOPEFUL.**  
LONDON, July 7. Prime Minister Lloyd George stated in the Commons to-day that he understood General Smuts went to Ireland on Tuesday last, on the invitation of Eamonn De Valera. Asked whether he had conferred with Smuts before the latter went to Ireland, the Premier replied laconically that he was seeing General Smuts constantly. In answer to another inquiry, Lloyd George said that none of the Dominion Premiers would attend the proposed Irish conference in London, to which De Valera and James Craig had been invited. There was official confirmation to-day of the statement that the outlook was hopeful and that nothing had transpired which seriously jeopardized the prospects of a settlement. General Smuts was to-day received in audience by the King.

**SMUTS WILL NOT ATTEND.**  
LONDON, July 7. The question whether General Smuts would attend Friday's meeting in Dublin between Eamonn De Valera and the Southern Unionists, was asked in the negative this evening. When it was announced that General Smuts would not go to Dublin tomorrow.

**S. PROPAGANDA AND BRITISH BACKWARDNESS.**  
LONDON, July 7. Sharp criticisms of the policy and slowness of communications by steamship, airplane and telegraph and wireless between Great Britain and the Dominions, were voiced at Tuesday's session of the Imperial Conference, at which a decision was reached to appoint a Committee to consider the development of communication throughout the Empire.

Christian Smuts, South African Premier, may be suggested as chairman of the proposed conference in London between the representatives of Southern and Northern Ireland and the British Government.

**U.S. TARIFF DENOUNCED.**  
WASHINGTON, July 7. Democratic members of Ways and Means Committee, in a minority report filed to-day in the House of Representatives denounced the administration Tariff Bill as "conspiracy to benefit a few favorites at the expense of all humanity."

**URGING SULTAN'S RESIGNATION.**  
ATHENS, July 7. The Turkish Nationalist Government in Ankara, according to advices from Constantinople, to-day has demanded that Sultan Mohammed the Sixth abdicate. The latter replied he was ready to abdicate in favor of any member of the Imperial Family, with the exception of Prince Abdul Mejid, legal heir, who belongs to the Nationalist party, the advices add.

**THE "WARRIOR" GREEKS.**  
LONDON, July 7. Prime Minister Lloyd George informed the House of Commons to-day in reply to a question, that the Greek reply to the Allied offer to mediate between the Greeks and Turkish Nationalists, which has just been received, is of a simple negative character. Therefore, he added, it did not call for immediate further action on the part of the British Government. An Athens despatch of June 26 gave an outline of the Greek reply to the Allied offer. It said that Greece found herself in a position in which military interests were to guide her conduct and decisions. Abandonment of offensive against the Turks, the note declared, would compromise and prejudice the position of Greece and give courage to the Turks. The communication added that Greece would be ready to hear concrete proposals from the Allies during every phase of the operations and that she hoped the Allies would obtain definite terms from the Turks.

**ANGLO-JAPANESE TREATY.**  
LONDON, July 7. Prime Minister Lloyd George stated in the House of Commons that he was fairly hopeful of being in a position to make a statement concerning the Anglo-Japanese Treaty on Monday next. He added, however, that such statement would depend on the replies received from the United States and China. Premature declaration, Mr. Lloyd George asserted, would interfere with the success of negotiations now in progress.

**C-3 EXPLODES.**  
WASHINGTON, July 7. The United States Naval Blimp C-3 exploded at the naval air station at Hampton Roads, Va., to-day. None of the four persons aboard the C-3 were seriously injured, according to reports to the Navy Department, but two were painfully injured. The big gas bag had just been released for a photographic flight, and was rising slowly when the explosion occurred. Those aboard jumped off with parachutes, according to reports. The Blimp was destroyed.

**S.S. CALLAO MISSING.**  
NEW YORK, July 7. Officials of the Munson Line admitted to-day that they had been trying unsuccessfully for two days to establish radio communication with the liner Callao, due here next Sunday from Buenos Aires and Rio de Janeiro. Recent reports of pirates operating off the United States Coast were deprecated by officials of the line, who added that it was possible atmospheric conditions or disabling of the Callao's wireless were responsible for the failure to raise her.

**A MYSTERIOUS VESSEL.**  
BOSTON, July 7. Fighting of a mysterious vessel, which came up within a few hundred feet of the Munson Line steamer Minalba, while she was off Cape May

on the morning of June 30, and then disappeared in the midst without making known her identity, was reported to-day by officers of the Minalba.

**FOREST FIRES IN N.S.**  
FREDERICTON, July 7. The forest fire situation in New Brunswick remains the same to-day. A number of small fires in the central part of the Province are causing smoky conditions which hamper the work of the lookouts. No very serious fires have yet been reported in the Province.

**AT BISLEY CAMP.**  
BISLEY CAMP, July 7. The fifty-eighth annual meeting of the National Rifle Association opens here to-day and continues for three weeks.

**INTERNATIONAL SOCCER.**  
PHILADELPHIA, July 7. Scotch soccer players, who are now touring Canada, will play an all-Philadelphia team here next Saturday. The local team will be selected from leading clubs of the city.

### End of a Long Trial.

One of the most astounding trials in history was concluded on July 8, 1921, at Vitarbo, Italy, when nineteen members of the Italian Carmorra—the secret society of criminals which terrorized Southern Italy—were found guilty of murdering, or assisting to murder, a couple named Criscuolo at Naples, on June 5, 1906. The Naples police either would not—as many believed—or could not find any trace of the murderers. At length the Duke of Aosta, incensed at some insults shouted at his wife when driving through the streets, insisted that a serious and determined effort should be made to clear the city of the Carmorra once and for all. The police were superseded by the Carabinieri, and at the head of them was placed Captain Fabroni, who brought into his work half-a-dozen men picked for their pluck and intelligence, who—disguised as ragamuffins, oysters and dock labourers—penetrated little by little into the haunts of the Neapolitan Carmorra. From all quarters of the world clues kept coming: one by one arrests were made, and in 1909, Abbatemaggio, a leading Carmorrist, was induced to turn king's evidence, and more of the gang were imprisoned. Of the 33 accused, 19 were placed in the cage made for the prisoners in the ancient church of Vitarbo; of the rest, one died in prison, and 18 were released because they had already passed in prison the maximum penalty for the crime of which they were accused—criminal association. 736 witnesses were cited to appear of whom 530 were examined during the 284 days the court sat—the trial lasting over a period of sixteen months. The evidence taken down in court filled 3,384 pages of foolscap. The documents sent as evidence by the examining magistrates filled 41 volumes, and the documents put in evidence by both sides during the trial, filled another 43 volumes; besides these, the records of 23 previous cases against the prisoners were consulted; twenty-three lawyers defended the prisoners and five prosecuted. Five of the men were sentenced to thirty years' imprisonment, and the 14 other prisoners to various terms of from five to twenty years. The most eloquent

lawyer was Lizz, who, in a speech lasting three weeks, summed up the defence for all the prisoners. This drastic punishment had the effect of putting a stop to the crimes which had previously been so rife.

### Grand Falls Commemoration Day July 3rd.

On Sunday July 3rd Grand Falls turned out in hundreds to honour the memory of those who fell in the great war. The day was a beautiful one, and in the opinion of the soldiers was very similar to the original first of July that brought such glory to the arms of the Regiment.

A Cross made of a sturdy spruce tree rose from a simple rostrum draped with the Union Jack and stood in a reserved space at the junction of Beaumont Avenue and Station Road. Around this the parade assembled after its route through some of the principal streets, and some beautiful musical selections by the Salvation Army Band and several splendid orations were delivered.

Nugent was unable to speak on behalf of the returned Soldiers, and although his many friends would have been glad to have heard him, nevertheless all appreciated the apt remarks of his substitute, Mr. Josiah Goodyear, though present at the ceremony, was unfortunately unable to speak on behalf of the public, as was originally planned.

Numerous wreaths were placed on the Cross, all very beautifully made, and considering the scarcity of flowers at this time of the year, one can hardly help wondering whence such pretty arrangements were conjured up.

The proceedings were admirably arranged and faultlessly carried out and no doubt represented considerable forethought and execution at the hands of the Committee in charge and of Capt. H. Williamson, Marshal of the Parade, all of whom deserve great praise.

An air of solemnity and earnestness seemed to surround the place and the thoughts of all were that day with the boys who will never return. They will not be forgotten; for theirs was the sacrifice, the duty of remembrance is ours. Whether with the blast of trumpets "Last Post" and crash of firing squad, or in the silent hearts of their friends, our tribute is paid it matters not after all; their names are on the Scroll of everlasting fame as they march in the ranks of the "Deathless Army"—OF.
