The peculiarity of the cardinal's worn. On one occasion only is it to be seen on the head of a cardinal and that is when the pope himself places it there as a symbol of its owner's elevation to the Sacred College. When the cardinal dies it is placed upon his coffin. The hat is of deeper red than that of the rob worn by the cardinal. It has long heavy silken cords, each with fifteen tassels at the end, hanging on either side. There are at present three "red hats" in Westminster Cathedral. They are those of Cardinals Wiseman, Manning and Vaughan. The crimson robes, which, like the hat, denote the cardinal's office, are made of a cloth which for several generations pas has been supplied by a firm of cloth merchants at Burtscheid, near Aix-la-Chappelle.
