Brith of the British Museum.

It is not generally known that the British Museum—that wonderful storehouse of treasures—was started from funds realized by a State Lottery. It certainly proves that it is easy to raise money by this means.

A special Act of Parliament was passed in 1753 to authorize the lot-

tery, and it mentions "sums which under the same Act were to be raised by public lottery for the purchase and support of the Museum."

The total sum was £200,000, and 50,000 tickets were printed, of which 4,153 were to be fortunate ones. There were prizes ranging from one of £10,000, one of £5,000, two of £1,000, down to £400 of £10.

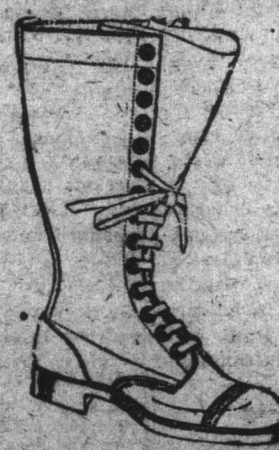
The prizes, together with £200 for the first ticket drawn, and £300 for the last ticket drawn, amounted to

£100,000. Further, there was "a like sum payable in respect of the corresponding tickets," making the grand total £200,000 in prizes, or two-thirds of the money to be subscribed.

There were several additional clauses dealing with the method of selling the tickets and of drawing them. Also selling chances for an enhanced sum was made illegal.

That the lottery was a success is proved by the fact that the British Museum is what it is to-day—the most wonderful museum in the world.

The Cardinal's Hat.

The peculiarity of the cardinal's hat is that it is not intended to be worn. On one occasion only is it to be seen on the head of a cardinal, and that is when the pope himself places it there as a symbol of his own elevation to the Sacred College. When the cardinal dies it is placed upon his coffin. The hat is of a deeper red than that of the robe worn by the cardinal; it has long heavy silken cords, each with fifteen tassels at the end, hanging on either side. There are at present three "red hats" in Westminster Cathedral. They are those of Cardinals Wiseman, Manning and Vaughan. The crimson robes, which, like the hat, denote the cardinal's office, are made of a cloth which for several generations past has been supplied by a firm of cloth merchants at Burscheid, near Aix-la-Chapelle. The process by which the dye is distilled is a jealously guarded secret.

Bigamy as a Business.

If a census of the world's bigamists could be taken, it would show that marrying for a living is by no means an unprofitable profession.

A case occurred recently in which a man had bigamously married an heiress, whose wealth he might have appropriated had his record not been discovered in time. As it was, he managed to live for some months at the expense of his "wife's" parents, from whom he obtained considerable sums.

One of the most notorious of professional bigamists was Dr. Vivian, who obtained \$63,000 from a score or more of "wives." Two or three of his victims were titled women, while another was the widow of a wealthy merchant.

Ninety-Seven "Wives."

The last of his dupes was a Birmingham heiress, whose fortune was saved at the eleventh hour, the doctor being arrested as he and his "wife" were about to start on their honeymoon.

Another marriage maniac was Robert Taylor, who defrauded thirty women with whom he entered into false marriage contracts. He posed as the son of a landed proprietor, and, in exchange for hard cash, made over enormous sums by spurious deeds of gift.

The record for bigamy appears to be held by a man named Witzhoff, who "married" ninety-seven different women, from many of whom he obtained money and property.—*Tit-Bits.*

Charcoal is so Handy.

If you want to keep fish perfectly fresh lay a few bits of charcoal on them.

A muslin bag of charcoal hung in the larder will keep the place sweet. Another bag hung on a hook in the wardrobe will remove any stinky smell. A vessel which has a nasty odour, such as an unwashed cabbage colander, may be made wholesome by rinsing in water to which powdered charcoal has been added.

Charcoal is the best and cheapest disinfectant for sinks and drains, and it has no smell. A piece of charcoal suspended in muslin in drinking water will filter the water and make it quite fit to drink.

Applied to burns, charcoal eases the pain and quickly heals. And cotton wool with a layer of charcoal is an excellent bandage for sores.

Charcoal is a fine tooth-powder. Though its use entails rinsing the mouth two or three times, this is well worth while, for charcoal is a searching purifier and leaves the teeth white and the breath sweet.
