

LaFollette Likely to Run for President as Independent

Tornado's Death Toll Reaches 45—Canadian National Still Show Big Deficit.

"THE DEATH RAY."
PARIS, May 28. The French appear to have a considerable lead in the apparent race to the nations to gain control of "Death Ray," invented by Grindell E. Smith, British scientist, who flew a Great Britain in a plane yesterday to resume negotiations with the capitalists after the British government had failed to give him the money he demanded. It was reported today that arrangements had been made for the signing of a contract on Friday between Matthews of the Chantiers Du Rhone Lyons company, negotiating the invention. This gave rise to considerable speculation as to what other countries might do. In the meantime Matthews nor the French entered with whom he is negotiating to confirm reports.

LAFOLETTE MAY RUN.
WASHINGTON, May 28. Senator Robert M. LaFollette today announced that he will run for President on an independent ticket, unless the approaching Democratic Republican Conventions demonstrate to the people whether either of the parties can and will purge itself of the evil influences that have dominated them.

THE DEFICITS ON CANADIAN NATIONAL LINES.

OTTAWA, May 28. G. P. Graham, Minister of Ways, announced in the House of Commons this afternoon that the total deficit on Canadian National lines

last year was \$52,779,350, including fixed charges, compared with \$53,836,511 the year before. The total income before fixed charges, was \$13,364,375, compared with \$14,442,260 the previous year. "If Sir Henry Thornton," said Mr. Graham, "is liable to maintain the same rate of improvement as he has achieved during the first year of his presidency of the railway, in addition to meeting operating charges, he ought to be able, within a very few years, to meet all interest charges due the public, which would be a wonderful achievement." The Canadian Government Merchant Marine showed a deficit after all charges, in including depreciation and interest, of \$3,368,670.

TORNADO'S CASUALTY TOLL.
ATLANTA, May 28. The total known death toll of the series of tornadoes which swept the South yesterday and Monday night for the second time in a month, had mounted to 45 to-day. Approximately a hundred persons are known to be injured; scores are made homeless, and property damaged to the extent of more than a million dollars.

STEVEDORE WHIRLED TO DEATH.
HALIFAX, May 28. Henry Harris, 48, well known foreman stevedore, was mangled to death this morning on the Norwegian steamer Andalusia, which is unloading West Indian cargo here. Harris became entangled in the winch rope which whirled him to death before the engine could be stopped.

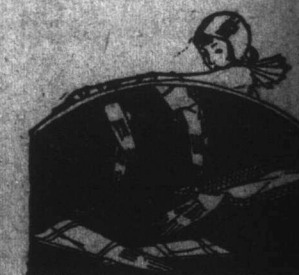
