consideration; and to them, for the pre-sent, he remits it. Since he will never ragain be a candidate for any office, and is not in accord with either of the great parties which have hisherto divided the country, he will be able, and will endea-your, to give wide and steadier regard to the progress of science, industry and nseful arts than a partisan journal can do, and he will not be provoked to in-dulge in those bitter personal terms which are the recognized bane of journalism. Sustained by a generous public, he will do his best to make the *Tribune* a power in the broader field it now contemplates, as when human freedom was in peril it was in the arena of political partisanship.
