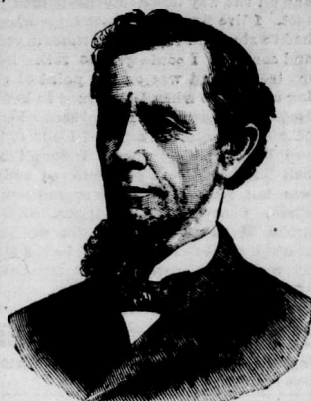

### The Late J. N. VanAmburg.

By the decease of the late J. N. Van Amburg, Esq., one of the most familiar figures of the county, has been removed. Tall and striking in appearance, with a kind benevolent face, and genial disposition; a gentleman of the old school. He was beloved and respected by all who had the pleasure of his acquaintance, and was a citizen of a modest retiring disposition, he enjoyed home and home surroundings, and the quiet of the rural life more than the contentions and activities of public life. Hospitable in the highest degree, many there are who will never forget their pleasant associations and hospitable entertainment with the deceased and his family, more in the nature of some of the fine old English homes described so admirably by Felicia Hemans. The father of the deceased bore the same name as the son, and was one of the early pioneers that settled on that part of the Lake Shore so widely known as "Nova Scotia Street"—one of that considerable number who came from the land made immortal by "Evangeline," a body of settlers by whom the southern portion of the riding has been made to literally blossom as the rose. Here he with others reared their homes, and as has been written of them, they are homes of taste and refinement. The subject of this short sketch was born on the 12th day of September, 1820, at the farm where he ended his days, the first day of November, 1898, the result of injuries received from a fall, which he survived only a few hours, having then reached the age of 78 years, 1 month and 18 days. In 1844 he intermarried with Nancy A., a daughter of the late Mr. Elliott, merchant of Vienna, and the golden wedding was celebrated more than four years since. Mrs. Van Amburg and two children; Mrs. Chandler, of Montreal, and Mr. Luther E. Van Amburg, of Detroit, survive the deceased, and have the warmest sympathies of the community in the unexpected bereavement which has befallen them. The deceased was a most consistent church member, and in politics a Conservative. His good citizenship, well rounded character, and sterling worth speak stronger and more lasting than any feeble words we can pen. The funeral obsequies were conducted by Revs. Carey and Shore.
