The work of obtaining the right-of-way for the Hydro-Electric line from St. Thomas to Windsor is to be started this week. It is stated that demands are coming into the department for low tension wires from small towns and villages and from farmers all through the country who are eager to obtain electric light and power.

His address was listened to with pleasure and profit by all present.

An appeal from the decision of the court of revision to the county judge against the assessment for the repair to government drain No. 1 and the assessment for the construction of the Macdonald drain, in the township of Moss, was heard before Judge Macbeth in the Town Hall on Tuesday afternoon. After the evidence of four engineers was taken, the judge reserved his decision. Mr. Reycraft, of Ridgeway, appeared for the appellants, and Messrs. Elliott, Glencoe, and Judd, London, in support of the by-law. The case is one that is creating considerable interest both to the parties assessed and to the ratepayers of the township at large.

He was about to step off the engine of his train as it was in motion, when becoming momentarily blinded by the flash of a torch he was carrying, he missed his footing and fell beneath the wheels. He was rushed to the Methodist Hospital, St. Thomas, where the limb was amputated three inches below the knee. The doctor says Mr. Hazlett will recover unless infection sets in. He is an unmarried man.
