The work of obtaining the right-of-way for the Hydro-Electric line from St. Thomas to Windsor is to be started this week. It is stated that demands are coming into the department for low tension wires from small towns and villages and from farmers all through the country who are eager to obtain electric light and power.

The collection at the English churches of Newbury and Wardsville for the Chinese Famine Fund on Sunday last was very gratifying. A total of \$29.89 was contributed—\$9.70 from Christ church, Newbury; \$15.50 from St. James church, Wardsville, and \$9.69 from the Sunday School of the latter place. His address was listened to with pleasure and profit by all present.

The Strathroy Dispatch says:—For some time past a business deal has been under way for the purchase of the drug business of Howard W. Thomson, by E. E. Sexsmith. Last week the details were concluded, and on Monday the new proprietor took possession of the premises. An appeal from the decision of the court of revision to the county judge against the assessment for the repair of government drain No. 1 and the assessment for the construction of the Macdonald drain, in the township of Mossa, was heard before Judge Macbeth in the Town Hall on Tuesday afternoon. After the evidence of four engineers was taken, the judge reserved his decision. Mr. Reynolds, of Ridgeway, appeared for the appellants, and Messrs. Elliott, Glencoe, and Judd, London, in support of the by-law. The case is one that is creating considerable interest, both to the parties assessed and to the ratepayers of the township at large.

Alfred Hazlett, Wabash brakeman, whose home is in Windsor, narrowly escaped death Thursday evening at Ekfrid siding. He was about to step off the engine of his train as it was in motion, when becoming momentarily blinded by the flash of a torch he was carrying, he missed his footing and fell beneath the wheels. His right foot was cut off above the ankle and he was otherwise cut and bruised. No one saw the accident but the conductor heard groans and pulling up the train went to the injured man's assistance. He was rushed to St. Thomas, where the limb was amputated three inches below the knee. The doctor says Mr. Hazlett will recover unless infection sets in. He is an unmarried man.
