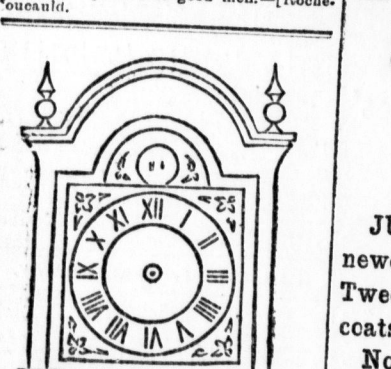

BINDER TWINE IN THE NORTH WEST.

John Nichols, a prominent settler in the Northwest, wrote last month to the Ontario press from Fort Qu'Appelle, Assiniboia, to the binder twine trade. He says:
"Last year the price charged by the local machine agents here was 17 cents per pound cash for best Canadian twine. The Patrons of Industry, however, purchased an equally good article of American make at 15 cents cash, or 14 cents till Dec. 1. But that was too much, as I will show. A short time ago I had occasion to write the supreme secretary, Patrons of Industry, to ask the price at which certain articles were furnished to members in the United States. Here is his reply:—Re binder twine—For best Red Elephant brand, anti-rust twine, we got last year 8 cents per pound. Eight cents for the American Patron, 17 cents for the average Northwest farmer! Even with the monopoly freight rates of the C. P. R., this twine, if duty free, could have been laid down here at 11 cents, or 6 cents per pound less than the Canadian article. See how this affects us here. A neighbor used over 1,000 pounds. His extra tax was over \$80. Nearly all the settlers here would use from 300 to 500 pounds each, or an extra tax on each one of from \$18 to \$30. What a grand way to promote the settlement of the Northwest!"

Must Settle There or Get Out.
BUFFALO, N. Y., June 8.—William Burgess, of Hamilton, Ont., was discharged at noon yesterday by the superintendent of the L. S. and M. S. machine shops at the request of Inspector De Barry. Burgess has been working for the company as a machinist for some time past and is the owner of considerable real estate in Hamilton, where his wife and family reside. Joseph Palucci's Death.
The jury that County Constable Wm.
Mason summoned to inquire into the death
of Joseph Palucci, who was shot at the
five range on Monday, was composed of
Henry Dwyre (foreman), John Kennedy,
Sidney Rogers, John Proctor, Wm.
McPherson, R. J. Wood, Edward
Gibson, Jonas Greives, Henry Parsons,
Abraham Cole, Alex. Smith, W. H.
Mishnick, Patrick Brazill, A. Gard-
ner and Theo. E. McNamara. Capt.
Denison, who was in charge of the squad at
the butte, testified that Palucci had no
business being where he was when he was
shot and that he came out in front of the
target contrary to instruction from the man
who fired the fatal shot was Private Charman,
one of the best men in the company and a
perfect soldier, who had never been charged
with any offense. Palucci and Charman
were on friendly terms and Palucci was en-
tirely to blame for the unfortunate occur-
rence. Charman was the only witness
called and court adjourned until Thursday
Registered at the Court House.

Among the hints on the back of the new
registration receipts are the following: A
person posting a registered letter should
not leave the postoffice until he has ob-
tained his receipt. The letter should bear
stamps to the full amount of the postage
and registration fees. The sender should
attend to the duty of payment of his letter
himself. A postmaster is only responsible
for doing that which is his duty to do, and
it is not his duty to place stamps on letters
for other people. Letters for registration
should be brought to the postoffice some
time before the mail closes. Persons re-
ceiving registered letters that call for ac-
knowledgegment would do frequently save
trouble to themselves and to the postoffice
by acknowledging them promptly.

ST. THOMAS, June 7.—The annual educa-
tional meeting was held. In the absence of
the president, caused by the sitting of the
stationing committee, Dr. Carman presided
and gave a very spirited address. Then he
called upon Rev. A. L. Russell, B.A., who
gave an address on the need of an educated
ministry.

Mr. Frith Jeffers, of London, spoke next.
He supposed he had to represent the laity.
He wanted to show how they looked at this
subject. He spoke of how in Australia they
had in one province adopted a system of
education in which they ignored religion,
and eliminated every reference to God and
moral obligation, and how they had seen
their error and its danger.

Rev. Dr. Shaw, of Montreal, spoke for a
short time. He said that they in his college
were training men to be strong, independ-
ent and aggressive. Owing to the lateness
of the hour he only spoke five minutes.
Collection was taken and the meeting was
closed.

TUESDAY MORNING.
Dr. Carman occupied the chair. The
first business was the report of the Whitty
Ladies' College, and was of an encouraging
character.

Next came the report of the committee
on the state of the work, and was read by
the Rev. R. C. Parsons.
Memorial report No. 2 was read and
adopted.

Temperance report was read by Rev. A.
J. Snyder. It especially commends the
selection of temperance and prohibition
candidates for parliamentary and municipal
honors.

Sabbath observance committee also re-
ported. Its report was adopted. It in-
dorses the proposal to urge upon over Gov-
ernment the proposal to secure the closing
of the Canadian department of the World's
Fair at Chicago. The committee was
ordered to prepare and report an appro-
priate resolution on the subject.

Sunday school committee report was next
read.
The vacancy of the delegation to the

General Conference caused by Rev. A. C.
Courtice, B.A., being transferred to Mon-
tré Conference was filled by a ballot vote
by the election of Rev. James Whitting, who
was the first reserve delegate.

Rev. J. G. Scott was elected representa-
tive on the Central Missionary Board.
Mr. A. Fowler, B.A., asked for a letter
of standing. On motion his request was
granted.

Rev. J. G. Scott announced that \$35 was
collected and was now presented to Miss
Graham, the postmaster.
The order of business for 3:30 p.m. is to
be the reading of the stations.

TUESDAY AFTERNOON.
Conference assembled at 3 o'clock.
After worship and reading of minutes
the report of the educational fund was read
and adopted. Then the report on the con-
stitution of the sustentation was read and
adopted.

At this juncture a deputation from Grace
Church Young People's Society was in-
troduced to the president, who was pre-
sented with a basket of beautiful flowers.
To an accompanying address the president
very happily replied. Closely following
these came two young men of the ordination
class to present a picture of the president
and themselves.

It was an order of the conference to pro-
vide for conference anniversary services
similar to the method of last year. The
thought of change from the anniversary
to that of religious services seemed to pre-
vail very widely in the conference.

Stations for the coming year were read
and the balloting proceeded for chairman
of districts.
