Hall, Vancouver, Frank Ballantyne, Lobo; A. Henderson, Appin; J. A. Brown, Belmont; James Ballantyne, South London; M. P. Talling, London; and Elder Edward Beattie, Westminster. Rev. James Ballantyne was appointed clerk, pro tem.
