energy. The weather has been generally

fair and very warm, with local thunder-

ly cool in the Eastern Provinces. The

wind has been moderate and variable on

the lakes. Maximum temperatures: Win-

nipeg, 68°; Toronto, 80°; Kingston, 72°;

Montreal, 70°; Quebec, 60°; Hal-

fax, 68°.
