Kansas City, Mo. Jan. 2.—A bin-raged Wednesday night and continued wigreatseverity yester/lay over Northern Missouri and Kansas. Kansas is covered with a blanket of snow four inches to a foot thick. Dispatches from different parts of Kansas indicate the almost entire cessation of all local railway business as a result of the storm. The Burlington eastbound passenger train is blockaded on the prairie eighteen miles north of Atchison, and the Missouri Pacific eastbound train is stalled north of Hawatha. Relief trains with provisions and fuel have been sent forward to the blockaded trains, but they, too, may be unable to plow through the huge drifts. The eastbound passenger train is tied up at Salina, Kansas, and the westbound Union Pacific train has been unable to get beyond Brookville. No freight trains were sent out from here after noon yesterday, and the passenger trains were all equipped with two engines and sow plows.
