THE WEATHER PROPHECY.

TORONTO, Jan. 26-11 p.m.—The pressure is comparatively high along the St. Lawrence Valley and in the Southern States, and below normal elsewhere. Light falls of snow have occurred in Ontario, Manitoba and portions of the Northwest Territories. Minimum and maximum temperatures: Calgary, 12°-47°; Winnipeg, 17°-21°; Toronto, 20°-30°; Montreal, 4°-20°; Quebec, 4° below -26°; Halifax, 2°-3°.

Local temperatures—Highest, 32°; lowest, 29°.

TORONTO, Jan. 27—10 a.m.—The indications for the next 24 hours for the lower lakes region (covering the peninsula and as far east as Belleville) are: Moderate winds; partly clear, comparatively mild; light local falls of snow or sleet.

LONDON AND ENVIRONS.

—Valentine Day falls on Saturday this year.

—The Schubert Quartet will appear to-night at Victoria Hall.

—Mr. Newton W. Rowell, of this city, preached at a union service in Hyde Park Methodist Church on Sunday.

—Cora Smith, charged by Thomas Partridge with assault, was remanded for a week by the police magistrate yesterday morning.

—Mrs. J. H. E. Jones, formerly of London West, died recently in Australia, where she had gone in company with her husband.

—The assessors' assistants are Messrs. D. Murray with Commissioner Grant, W. M. Peel with Mr. Toll, Thomas Brown with Mr. Fairgrieve.

—Feb. 9 is the date fixed for the entertainment and ball in the East End Hall, under the auspices of "A" Company of the Seventh Fusiliers.

—Mayor Taylor and about 25 local brethren will attend the institution of a new Knights of Pythias lodge at Petrolia this evening.

—Rev. A. C. Courtie, of this city, and Rev. R. J. Trevelyan, of St. Thomas, exchanged pulpits Sunday. Rev. Mr. Tre-

leven was formerly pastor of the Queen's Avenue and Askin Street Methodist Churches here.

The case of murder that has been pending for some time against Bob Murray, of Port Huron, formerly of this city, has been nolle prosequat at Leper.

—Large numbers of Canadian and United States sportsmen are registered at the various hotels. They are interested in the London Gun Club's shooting tournament.

—Messrs. George A. Somerville and W. F. Bullen, of this city, have been chosen members of the executive committee of the Land Mortgage Companies' Association of Ontario.

—C. W. Henderson, who died at Jackson, Mich., on Jan. 7, and was stated to be former Londoner, was in reality from Wingham, Ont. His parents are now residing in that place.

—In the absence of the rector the Dean of Huron conducted the morning service in Memorial Church on Sunday. The Bishop of Huron preached in the evening, the church being crowded to the doors.

—The newly-added electric lights were in operation Sunday night, and shed their bright beams on many local residents that have hitherto been left in comparative darkness. The improvement was much needed, and it was decidedly noticeable.

—Rev. J. G. Fallis, of Warwick preached two excellent sermons in Queen's Park Methodist Church Sunday. Rev. W. Hayhurst, the pastor, occupied the pulpit of the Warwick Methodist Church, where special educational services were held.

—The non-com of the Seventh have secured rooms in the Ontario Loan and Debenture building, and are fitting them up in order that their mess may have cozy down-town quarters. The new apartments will be opened shortly with a smoking concert.

—The Bristol horse show turned away a couple of hundred people on Saturday afternoon, and standing room only could be obtained quite a time before the performance began. There was also a big audience in the evening.

The organization went from here to Toronto.

—Meritt Dean, of London, Ont., is visiting his cousins, Mrs. J. E. Gilmore and Mrs. John McMillan, of this city. Charles E. Taylor and sisters, Carrie and Gladys, have gone to London and Parkhill, Ont., on a six weeks' visit with relatives and friends. (Port Huron Times.)

—John McInerney, a Buffalo young man, is said to have raised a racket on a G. T. R. west bound train Sunday, while drunk, and was handed over to Constable Allison upon its arrival here. The police magistrate remanded him until to-day, when the conductor will be present to give evidence.

—At Ottawa Saturday night the Royal Military College Graduates' Society elected officers as follows: President, Capt. S. A. Denison, London, Ont.; first vice-president, Major Percy, Prince Albert; second vice-president, J. Houlston, Three Rivers; secretary-treasurer, F. W. White, Ottawa.

—Dr. A. Gebeon, of Alfred, county of Prescott, has been fined \$50 and costs for practicing medicine without a license, and being heard before Mr. P. W. McDonald, of Hastings, and W. Webb, of this city. Physicians and Surgeons of Ontario, prosecuted.

—Mrs. Tilley, of London, organizing agent of the W. A. M. A., in the diocese of Huron, will address a public meeting in Holy Trinity Church, North Chatham, next Tuesday evening, for the purpose of organizing a branch in connection with that church. Mrs. Tilley will also address a meeting of the King's Daughters the same day at the rectory. (Chatham Planet.)

—Charles Fruiter, the Caradoc youth who was found in the city Saturday with a horse and rig that did not belong to him, was allowed to go by the magistrate yesterday on the representation of his employer, Mr. Thomas Burns. Fruiter did not intend anything wrong, but the absence of Mr. and Mrs. Burns possessed himself of the turn-out to convey his best gift to a tea meeting. Finding her away from home he took a notion to drive into London on a visit to his sister. Mr. Burns said he would take back the boy, who, though peculiar sometimes, was a fairly good youth.

—The death of an old resident of London, Mr. James Ward, is reported from Toronto. Mr. Ward came to London in 1846 when he was a young man, and lived here until about six years ago. He enlisted in the Hundredth Regiment and had served about seven years when he obtained his discharge. He afterwards carried on the tailoring business for some years. The deceased was a lifelong Reformer, and was of a genial and kindly disposition. His death will be much regretted by many of his old friends in this city.

—The funeral of the late Miss Jessie Conning took place from her mother's residence on Adelaide street Saturday afternoon in the Presbyterian Cemetery. Rev. J. A. Murray conducted the services, and was assisted by Revs. W. J. Clark, Walter M. Roger and James Gordon. The floral offerings were numerous, and included magnificent anchor from the teachers and officers of King Street Presbyterian Sunday school, where the deceased had been a teacher until a short time before her death. Messrs. John McEwen, R. G. G. Gibson, Robert Morrison and Charles Somerville acted as pall-bearers.

—The Children's Envoys of the Baptist Sunday school, held the other evening, entertained a large audience. The interested parents supplied a bountiful tea for the children at 7 o'clock, which was served to the entire satisfaction of the young people. Having done justice to the hearty repast, a short intermission of social chat was indulged in by all present. The superintendent, Mr. H. W. Sutherland, who occupied the chair, called to order the gathering and opened with prayer, followed by singing of the school. The chairman then read the annual report, which showed a very satisfactory standing of the school, both in attendance and financially.

An excellent programme was furnished, in which many of the children participated, doing thorough justice to their talent, manifested itself in the numerous readings, recitations, solos and duets. Thus the audience was delighted until the chairman was compelled by the lateness of the hour to inform the children, to their regret, that it was time for them to seek their nests. The doxology being sung the happy gathering separated.

TELEGRAMS IN A NUTSHELL.

A farmer in Colchester, Essex county, realized \$500 from his tobacco crop last year.

The United States Government has decided that sago flour is dutiable at the rate of 2 cents a pound, as starch.

The remains of Mr. Alex. Mercier, brother of Hon. Mr. Mercier, were buried in the family vault on Mount Royal to-day (Monday).

At Brussels a thaw has set in and floods have resulted. The River Senne, which flows through the city, has overflowed its banks for miles.

Although defeated in the North Perth election contest, Dr. Ahrens is being congratulated by his friends upon becoming the father of a fine, healthy daughter, which was born on Friday.

John Mitchell, editor of the Hanover (Ont.) Post, met with a serious accident Saturday. One of the job printers was running the hand-press when something got loose, which Mr. Mitchell attempted to fasten. In doing so his left hand was lacerated and pressed almost out of shape.

While fire engine No. 1 was going to a fire Saturday evening at Jersey City and while crossing the railroad track an express train dashed into it, killing Driver Dinan and both horses. Two barrels of turpentine exploded in the cellar of the burning building, killing Chief Engineer Farrar, who died from suffocation. Several firemen were seriously injured. Hoseman McDonald's condition is critical.
