PARNELL'S MOTHER

Murderously Assaulted by a Highwayman in New Jersey. BORDENTOWN, N. J., April 19.-

Mrs. Delia T. S. Parnell, mother of the late Charles Stewart Parnell, who lives at Ironsides, overlooking the Delaware River near here, was found bleeding and unconscious late last night by Charles Casey, son of the farmer who has charge of the farm at Ironsides. While descending a hill which marks the boundary of the property formerly occupied by Mrs. Parnell's father, young Casey heard the moans of some one apparently in distress. Hurrying to the spot he found Mrs. Parnell lying beside the fence with her face covered with blood. By her side were two small pieces of board, a piece of fence paling about three feet long, and a brick. Help was obtained and she was carried to the house of Farmer Casey. Dr. W. H. Ships, who was hastily summoned, made an examination and found that besides several bruises about the face, the woman had a lacerated wound on the right side of the head, from which the blood flowed freely. Mrs. Parnell is unconscious, and because of her advanced age her condition is regarded as critical. The authorities are unable to determine whether she was assaulted or fell and received her injuries. Her hand bag was found alongside the railroad track near by, with her pocketbook missing, and papers scattered in all directions. This circumstance lends an air of probahility to the theory that she was brutally assaulted and robbed. Mrs. Parneil frequently came to this place at night and remained until a late hour.

She was here last night. Mrs. Parnell had walked from her residence to Bordentown, a distance of one mile, to get a small check cashed. Her movements were watched by some highwaymen who saw her receive the money. The men followed her until she had reached a lonely spot near the "Ironsides" mansion. The men were arrested. They are Samuel Martin, Warren Deekin, Tallen Long, Louis Feiter, and Clarke E. Phillips—all young men. The prisoners were arraigned before Justice Potts this morning and committed for trial. It is estimated that the gang stole goods valued at many thousands of dollars, consisting of dress goods, cloth, clothing, umbrellas, etc., and was taken from freight cars while heing transferred on flat cars from New York to Jersey City. The chances of Mrs. Parnell's recovery are extremely doubtful.

PUT A TIE ON THE TRACK.

Accident Narrowly Averted on the Lake Erie Railway.

Thomas Russel's Dangerous Prank Lands Him in Jail.

A deed which might have entailed heavy damage to property and possibly the loss of human lives was perpetrated on the Port Stanley Railway about five miles from this city on Thursday afternoon. How an accident was averted is marvelous.

About 5:30 o'clock in the afternoon in question the Lake Erie passenger train, due in London at 5:40, was approaching the city, when after turning a curve near Westminster station, Engineer Porteous saw a tie on the track a short distance ahead. The train was going at a high rate of speed. To stop it before reaching the obstruction aws impossible. Porteous did the next best thing, in his opinion, and reversed the engine and applied the air brakes. When the tie was struck the rate of speed was slightly reduced, but the pilot was sufficiently low to prevent the obstruc-tion from getting under the wheels. The tie wasn't even thrown between the rails. It was carried along ahead of the train for nearly half a mile, when a standstill was reached, and the engineer and fireman drew a sigh of re-

Little Tommy Russell, of Pall Mall street, only about 14 or 15 years of age, bcarded the train then and rode to the city. The case was reported to G. T. R. Constable Logan, who, learning that he had got on board near the scene of the affair, questioned Timmy as to his conduct in that neighborhood. The youth denied having placed the tie on the rails, and blamed two boys named Thompson. Constable Logan saw the Thompsons yesterday, and they gave satisfactory accounts of their doings on that day. Russell was placed under ar-rest last night, and though at first asserting his innocence, afterwards con-fessed his misdeeds. He said he had just walked out the track four or five mile for the purpose of riding in on a train, and these were the means he took to accomplish his object-with safety to himself.

Russell has been a newsboy around the streets for several years. Recently Mr. Sam Grigg took him to the Newsboys' Home, but could nothing with him and he had to be turned away. The boy it believed to be weak-minded.
RUSSELL REMANDED.

Thomas Russell, the Pall Mall street boy who was arrested for placing a tie on the track of the Lake Erie and Detroit River Railway near Westminster, did not appear before the police magistrate this morning. He was taken before Squire J. B. Smyth and remanded until Tuesday to be brought before the county judge. The boy was very re-pentant, and cried bitterly to be allowed to go home. His parents were present, and they keenly felt the disgrace of the youth's misdoings. Mr. and Mrs. Russell had a long talk with Mr. Mrs. Russell had a long talk with Mr. C. C. Young, the local superintendent of the railway. "It is the best thing that can be done both for the good of the boy and the public," said Mr. Young, and the parents readily acquiesced. When about 3 years old he was afflicted with spinal disease, and for years his life was despaired of. Tommy got well again, how-ever, but ever since has been a source of trouble to his parents. They believe the illness has caused brain trouble.
