**LONDON AND ENVIRONS.**Once more we find him tempting fate,  
And by his own design.His favorite sport is still to skate  
Around the "Danger" sign.—Mr. Wm. Butler, of the Detroit News,  
is in the city for a couple of days.—Four rinks including the leading curlers  
of the city leave this morning to take part  
in a bonspiel, at Sarnia.—The annual ball of the Brotherhood of  
Railroad Trainmen, announced for the 17th  
inst. at the City Hall, promises to be a  
great success.—The annual meeting of St. George's  
Society will be held on Thursday evening,  
when besides general business the officers  
for the year will be elected.—Rev. Norman Lindsey, of Lobo, who  
had his head badly cut as a result of his  
horse taking fright at the electric car in  
London West, is progressing favorably.—The case of Navin vs. Pendergast,  
which was to have taken place at Detroit  
on Wednesday, Jan. 3, was withdrawn by  
Navin, the plaintiff, who pays all costs of  
the action.—Quite a gathering of friends met Mon-  
day at the home of Mr. Wm. Nesbitt,  
Hill street, and after dinner the company,  
to the number of 35, all relatives, were  
photographed on the lawn.—Yesterday morning there were three  
new cases of diphtheria reported—one on  
Nelson street, another on King street, and  
a third on Hill street. A scarlet fever  
placard has been ordered up on Wellington  
street.—Many friends of Mr. C. A. Gillespie,  
clothes of this city, will sincerely sym-  
pathize with him in the death on Thursday  
at London of his eldest daughter, a bright,  
lovely girl, 12 years of age. The funeral  
takes place at London. [Brantford Courier.]—The Globe Casket Company recently  
added a 100-light electric dynamo, for  
the purpose of manufacturing their own illu-  
minations to the already extensive plant em-  
ployed in that institution. This new de-  
partment works admirably, and effects a con-  
siderable saving. Ninety lights are now  
in use.—A well known Montreal firm recom-  
mend to merchants this plan of keeping  
frost off windows: "An electric fan is  
placed in the window, one of the incandes-  
cent lamps removed, where the windows are  
so lighted, and the fan placed in connection;  
a current of air thus directed against the  
glass dispels the moisture and the result is,  
glass as clear as in midsummer."—The final meeting of the London West  
Council of 1893 was held on Thursday at  
the clerk was instructed to apply for a special  
act to consolidate the floating debt. Reso-  
lutions of appreciation were passed to the  
retiring members, Reeve Platt and Coun-  
cillors Collins and Smith. The latter gave  
a detailed statement of his work during the  
year, which was highly entertaining. A  
number of accounts were passed.—Edward Walker has established a dis-  
reputable reputation for himself in the  
past year and a half, having during that  
time been before Magistrate Patrick on  
several occasions, as well as having served  
a term in the Central Prison. He was  
given four months under Gov. Massie's  
guardianship this morning in the Police  
Court on a charge of drunkenness and  
vagrancy. Mrs. Matilda Meda was fined  
\$5, with the option of twenty days in jail,  
for being a vagrant.—Mr. Thomas Taylor, who died at his  
residence on Queen's avenue yesterday, had  
been ill for a short time. He was  
first taken ill with the grip, which af-  
terwards turned into pneumonia. Mr. Taylor  
gradually growing worse until death ended  
his sufferings. He was born in this city 27  
years ago and was a son of Mr. George  
Taylor, 910 Queen's avenue. Deceased was  
married about seven years ago to Miss  
Greene, of Queen's avenue east, and as a  
result of this union there are left a widow  
and three children to mourn their sad loss.—Rev. N. Lindsay, of Ivan, a member of  
the London Presbytery, was returning  
home from St. Thomas yesterday afternoon,  
and while driving through London West  
his horse became frightened and ran away.  
Mr. Lindsay was thrown out on the hard  
road and was severely hurt about the head.  
He was discovered shortly afterwards and  
removed to the residence of Mr. W. J.  
Clark, where the wounds were dressed.  
The horse and buggy have not yet been

the Court of Appeal to-day in a singular  
suit from the Forest City. The question at  
issue is as to whether a car load of hogs  
means a single or double tier. The Cana-  
dian Packing Company of London is ask-  
ing the court to confirm the judgment of  
the lower court that it means a single tier.  
Judgment reserved.**With the Workmen.**At the annual meeting of the Trades and  
Labor Council held in their hall, Dufferin  
avenue, last evening, the matter of ex-  
tending the influence of workmen in the  
political affairs of the country was exten-  
sively discussed. For the purpose it  
was decided to form a political  
organization in each ward of the city to  
be called "Workmen's Legislative Club."  
Messrs. J. T. Marks, James Taylor  
and H. B. Ashplant were appointed to  
draft a platform of the plan upon which  
these organizations will be conducted. It  
was pointed out during the meeting that  
the object of these bodies would chiefly beto secure the passage of legislation favor-  
able to the wage-earners and unite the vote  
of the workers in all municipal and parlia-  
mentary elections. The officers elected  
were as follows:President—P. H. Hensell.  
Vice-President—James Reardon.  
Secretary—Joseph T. Marks.  
Financial Secretary—H. B. Ashplant.  
Treasurer—T. C. Thornhill.  
Sergeant-at-Arms—W. Carrol.  
Auditors—Isaac Clark and W. Carrol.**A Coming Demonstration.**At a meeting of the St. Andrew's So-  
ciety last night—President Clarke in the  
chair—it was unanimously resolved to  
have a Burns celebration concert, with the  
usual accompaniments of Highland dan-  
cing, in the Grand Opera House, if date and  
terms can be arranged, within the next  
three weeks. An influential committee  
was appointed to make the needed arrange-  
ments. The demonstration promises to be  
a popular one in every respect. The pro-  
ceeds go, as usual, to the charitable funds  
of the society, which, owing to the dis-  
tress in the city, have been heavily drawn  
on recently.**Temperance Stock-Taking.**The regular meeting of the Women's  
Christian Temperance Union was held yester-  
day afternoon in Somerset Hall. Mrs.  
Thornley, president, presided. There was  
a large attendance. Aside from the  
ordinary routine business, the occasion  
was mainly set apart for what  
was called stock-taking—namely,  
taking into account the progress and  
present position of the temperance move-  
ment. Mrs. J. W. Jones, in an able paper,  
dealt with the growth of the London W. C. T. U. Mr. D. A. McDermid had been as-  
signed the advancement of the cause in the  
city as a whole during the past few years,  
and handled his subject in an interesting  
and tactful manner. Mr. John Cameron  
gave a bird's-eye view of the past, present  
and future of the temperance cause in On-  
tario, covering a period of about 50 years.  
Votes of thanks were accorded the three  
speakers. The president announced that  
Jan. 23 would be "Crusade Day," when it  
is expected a large increase in the member-  
ship will be made.**Liberal Tariff Platform.**We, the Liberal party of Canada, in con-  
vention assembled declare:That the customs tariff of the Dominion  
should be based, not as it now is, upon the  
protective principle, but upon the require-  
ments of the public service.That the existing tariff, founded upon an  
unsound principle and used as it has been  
by the Government as a corrupting agency,  
whereby to keep themselves in office, has  
developed monopolies, trusts and combina-  
tions:It has decreased the value of farm and  
other landed property;It has oppressed the masses to the en-  
richment of the few;

It has checked immigration;

It has caused great loss of population;

It has impeded commerce;

It has discriminated against Great  
Britain.In these, and in many other ways, it has  
occasioned great public and private injury,  
all of which evils must continue to grow in  
intensity so long as the present tariff system  
remains in force.That the highest interests of Canada de-  
mand a removal of this obstacle to our  
country's progress, by the adoption of a  
sound fiscal policy, which, while not doing  
injustice to any class, will promote do-  
mestic and foreign trade and hasten the re-  
turn of prosperity to our people.That to that end, the tariff should be re-  
duced to the needs of honest, economical  
and efficient government.That it should be so adjusted as to make  
free, or to bear as lightly as possible upon  
the necessities of life and should be so  
arranged as to promote freer trade with  
the whole world, more particularly Great  
Britain and the United States.We believe that the results of the pro-  
tective system have grievously disappointed  
thousands of persons who honestly sup-  
ported it, and that the country in the light  
of experience is now prepared to declare  
for a sound fiscal policy.The issue between the two political  
parties on this great question is now clearly  
defined.The Government themselves admit the  
failure of their fiscal policy, and now pro-  
fess their willingness to make some  
changes, but they say that such changes  
must be based only on the principle of  
protection.We denounce the principle of protection  
as radically unsound and unjust to the  
masses of the people, and we declare our  
conviction that any tariff changes based on  
that principle must fail to afford any sub-  
stantial relief from the burdens under  
which the country labors.This issue we unhesitatingly accept and  
upon it we await with the fullest con-
