# AT OTTAWA

Miss Bessie Blair and Henry A. Harper Drowned!

Sixty-Five Persons Poisoned at a Wisconsin Wedding Feast.

Three New Orleans Ladies Burned to Death-Fatal Results of a Fire at Carnegie, Pa.

Ottawa, Dec. 6.-Miss Bessie, fourth daughter of the Hon. A. G. Blair, minister of railways and canals, and Henry A. Harper, associate editor of the Labor Gazette, and acting deputy minister of labor, were drowned tonight in the Ottawa River about a mile from the city. They had been skating, and Harper lost his life while bravely trying to save Miss Blair and Alex. Creelman, a clerk in the Imperial Bank. Hon. A. G. and Mrs. Blair are in Clifton Springs, N. Y. Creelman was rescued by Mr. A. N. C. Tredgold, of Dawson City, in an exhausted condition, and is now under medical treatment at his lodging

house.

SCENE OF THE DISASTER. The accident happened about dusk on the main channel of the Ottawa River, where the current is swift and the water about 35 feet deep. The Misses May and Bessie Blair, Miss. Snowball, daughter of Senator Snowball, Halifax, who was a guest of the Misses Blair, Messrs Harner. Tred-Misses Blair, Messrs. Harper, Tred-gold and Creelman, were out skating, and had gone several miles down the river from the city. They were re-turning, Miss Bessie Blair and Creelman skating hand-in-hand ahead. Harper and Miss Snowball about forty yards behind, and Tredgold and Miss Blair some distance further away.
