

OLDEST MEMBER OF LONDON PRESBYTERY DIED TODAY

Few Days' Illness.

He Was One of the Best Known Presbyterians in Canada.



ERY MANY Londoners and friends elsewhere will learn with the deepest regret of the death of Rev. J. A. Proudfoot, D. D., which ocat 8 curred o'clock this morn-

ing at his home on Oxford street, London Township. On Saturday evening he suffered an apoplectic stroke, and never regained consciousness.

Dr. Proudfoot was one of the best known, and the oldest, of the members of the Presbytery of London, and was always one of its ablest workers. His zeal, earnestness and strength of personal character were re

even to the very last.

His association with the work of the Christian church in Ontario extended over a period of 54 years, and the gold-en jubilee of his ministry was marked by the members of the Presbytery of London by interesting services, during which the aged divine was presented with a beautiful oil painting of himself. It was accompanied by an address, in which his labors during his long connection with Presbyterianism in Ontario were appreciatively commented up-His death will be a great loss to his friends and the church.

He was born in Perthshire, Scotland, in 1821. In the summer of 1832 he came with his parents to America, and after spending a few months in New York State came to Toronto and settled in London in the spring of

His father, Rev. William Proudfoot, undertook the training of young men for the ministry of the United Presbyterian Church, the Rev. Dr. Caven, of Toronto, and Dr. Proudfoot being among his students. Dr. Proudfoot was licensed to preach in 1847, and labored for three years in St. Marys and vicinity. Some idea of the growth of Presbyterianism in that district, and of the work done by individual men in those days, may be inferred from the fact that now

Death of Rev. Dr. Proudfoot After seven congregations occupy the field which this young minister served alone. The home mission work which also he was called to do took him frequently to all parts of Ontario, from Sarnia to Toronto.

From St. Marys he was called to succeed his father as pastor of the First Presbyterian Church here, where he labored until 1890. Shortly after began his work in London his church was destroyed by fire, and a deputation from the Central Church, of Detroit, came here to induce Dr. Proudfoot to accept a call, which he promptly declined on account of the needy condition of his church at that time. In addition to the work of the pastorate, and at the call of the church,

est. His church connection was with the new St. James' congregation. occasion of his jubilee Dr. Proudfoot told of the journey which he made with his father from Toronto, which they made by boat to Fort Stanley, and from there to London by wagon, the journey taking ten days. The purchase of a lot for the site of a was his father's first consideration, and he was successful in getting one on York street, two doors west of where the Tecumseh House is. The lot was covered with forest at that time, but with the aid of some Westminster yeomen, a clearing was soon effected, and the erection of the edifice begun. The population at that time was small, among the inhabitants beonly five Presbyterian families. Dr. Proudfoot married a daughter of the late Dr. Coleman, of St. Marys, who survives him, with eight children—two sons and six daughters—all of whom live here, except John J. A. Proudfoot, M.D., and Mrs. H. A. Davidson, of Woodstock. Mr. William Proudfoot, barrister, of this city, is a son. One daughter is a nurse, and another is a teacher at the Conservatory of Music. Other members of the family are at home. Two brothers still survive him—Hon. William Proudfoot, of Toronto, and Robert, of Goderich.

The funeral will be held on Friday, at 3 o'clock in the afternoon. The services will be held at 2:30 o'clock.

PATIENTS IN THE JAILS Death of Mrs. Charles Taylor

Most of Them Should Go to Poorhouse, Not Asylum.

Unfortunates Who Can't Pay for Medical Examination.

Chief Justice Meredith, in charging the grand jury on Monday, spoke very strongly in regard to the inadequate system of dealing with persons awaiting investigation as to their sanity. He deplored their temporary confinement in the jails especially.

Commenting on the large number of these persons at present under his care, Governor Boston says that radical changes will have to be made before the evil can be remedied. Most of the cases are those of aged persons, who have no means of support. The poorhouse would be the proper place for them. To speak of them as danger-

ously insane is ridiculous.
Generally the friends of these unfortunates, who are awaiting medical examination, are too poor to furnish the physicians, and it falls upon the county authorities to do so. This means fur-ther delay, and is likely to prove fatal to such persons as are really suffering from insanity. And, finally, it not infrequently happens that persons committed to the asylum are returned to the jail authorities for disposal some charitable institution. The only way to dispose of the evil appears to be the establishing of wards in the asylums for the handling of these cases, as this would insure prompt and expert action in all instances.
