

RUSS SOLDIERS CRY FOR REVENGE

Are Anxious to Redeem the
Slaughter at the Yalu.

RUSSIA IS WEAK IN NUMBERS

Another Big Land Battle at Hand
in Vicinity of Feng
Wang Cheng.

St. Petersburg, May 5. — Gen. Kuropatkin has gone to the front from Liao Yang to inspect the situation personally. Troops are being hurried forward from the Liao Yang and Mukden line to a position near Feng Wang Cheng. All the Russian wounded have been sent toward Liao Yang, in order not to encounter the operations of the Russian army. It appears evident that Gen. Kuropatkin is preparing to give battle to Gen. Kuroki's army if circumstances warrant. Private reports are to the effect that the fighting blood of the Russian soldiers is up, and that they are thirsting for an opportunity to revenge the slaughter on the Yalu. Although the commander-in-chief is greatly chagrined at the miscarriage of his plans on the Yalu there is no idea here that he will act rashly on that account. His decision as to the extent of the opposition he will make at Feng Wang Cheng depends upon the location and strength of the enemy.

AT OTHER POINTS.

There is no confirmation in London of the Paris rumor that an engagement between Russian and Japanese squadrons had taken place off Vladivostok, and St. Petersburg knows nothing of the rumored capture of New Chang. It is reported that the Japanese advanced to within 18 miles of Feng Wang Cheng, and that an engagement is expected almost immediately. Major-General Kuropatkin's insistence on the fact that he was ordered to accept battle by Lieut.-General Zassalitch is interpreted as showing his intention to throw the responsibility upon that officer for risking a fight with his inferior forces, and to confirm the reports that General Zassalitch had been censured.

Reports have reached London that the Japanese captured a quantity of railroad material after Sunday's battle. This is supposed to indicate that the Russians had made great progress with the railroad from the main Manchurian line to the Yalu. This is so it would be a simple matter for the Japanese to repair this line, which would materially assist them in their advance through a difficult country. English correspondents with the Japanese forces on the Yalu are permitted to send ample descriptions of the people and country traversed, but not a word about the fighting.

RUSSIANS ARE WEAK.

The Standard's Tien Tsin correspondent says he is convinced that the Russian position in Southern Manchuria is exceedingly weak in consequence of the enormous number of men detached to fight the Yalu and to obtain provisions. He believes that the forces at Hsiang Cheng and Liao Yang are greatly overestimated. The camps, he says, are numerous, but there are few men in them. There are several fortifications in the hills between Feng Wang Cheng and Hsiang Cheng, but the lines of communication are weak and straggling.

KUROPATKIN NEXT.

London, May 5. — A Tokyo dispatch says: "The rumor which has reached here from Europe that Gen. Kuropatkin, the commander-in-chief of the Russian troops in the Far East, is personally leading 20,000 men from Liao Yang to Feng Wang Cheng, is welcomed as good news, on the theory that the more aggressive the Russian

campaign becomes the more speedy will be Japan's final victory."

PRISONERS WELL TREATED.

London, May 5. — United States Consul Green in Vladivostok, has sent the following telegram to the United States embassy regarding the treatment of the 26 Japanese officers and 181 men captured on board the steamers Kinsu-Maru, Nihama-Maru, and Goyo-Maru, sunk by Rear-Admiral Yezzen's squadron April 25. The survivors left here through a dense crowd, soldiers and sailors guarding the carriages of the officers, for Irkutsk, Siberia, April 28. Along the route through the city there were no hostile demonstrations or expressions. "The Russian military and naval authorities were courteously attentive. Food, tobacco, and money were furnished to the prisoners for the journey. The Japanese were deeply grateful for their kind treatment. Russia has agreed to recognize and afford every facility to the four Japanese Red Cross ships, Sakko-Maru, Kobe-Maru, Sakul-Maru and Kosai-Maru.

JAPS BUY STEAMERS.

London, May 5. — The Berlin Vossische Zeitung says it is informed that the North German Lloyd Steamship Company has sold to the Japanese Government eight steamers belonging to its East Asiatic lines for war purposes. A JAPANESE LOAN.

It is said in financial circles that negotiations are approaching a conclusion with financial houses in London for the issue of a Japanese loan of \$25,000,000 at 93, the security being a first charge on the customs. Some reports current here state that the Japanese loan will be \$50,000,000, at 6 per cent, and will be issued simultaneously with the loan of \$25,000,000.

PRAISE FOR JAPS.

The Berlin newspapers have largely given up their disposition to belittle the Japanese victory on the Yalu. The first observations of the political editors are now followed by articles from military critics, one of whom declares that the loss of half the Russian artillery "spells defeat as a phrase." This writer pronounces the Japanese action to have been magnificent, while all the critics emphasize the morale of the victory.

The Tokio correspondent of the Times sends the following: "The Japanese consider that Russian strategy at the battle of the Yalu showed the same defect as that of the Chinese in 1894, namely, the lack of offensive initiative. Capt. Arima, who commanded in some of the attempts to block Port Arthur, in a lecture which he delivered here said that the Japanese, from observations, had an accurate knowledge of Vice-Admiral Makarov's tactics, which enabled them to place the mines that destroyed the Petropavlovsk. The men of the entire Japanese squadron refrained from the use of tobacco and wine on the day of the disaster, to show that they mourned the death of Makarov. No Japanese torpedo boat or torpedo boat destroyer has been obliged to return to the harbor for repairs since the beginning of the war. All have been repaired at sea."

500 WOUNDED.

St. Petersburg telegrams say the hospitals at Harbin have received 500 wounded, and have received notice that considerably more may be expected. The number of prisoners taken by the Japs is given as about 1,000.

A dispatch from Seoul says: The Japanese authorities here are making preparations to celebrate their victory on the Yalu next Friday. The celebration will take the form of athletic games, orations, lantern processions and a banquet, to which the chief Korean officers, members of the legations and prominent foreigners are being invited. The soldiers are well enthusiastic and are shouting and embracing one another in the streets.

ST. PETERSBURG HEARS OF IT.

St. Petersburg, May 5, 2:16 p.m. — There are persistent rumors here of naval engagement between the Vladivostok and Vice-Admiral Kamimura's squadrons, but no confirmation of the reports had been received here up to 1 o'clock this afternoon.

The admiralty says no further news has been received there from Port Arthur.

STRANDED IN A CANYON

The Unpleasant Predicament of 3,000
Methodists.

Los Angeles, Cal., May 5. — Three thousands Methodists were stranded in the Grand Canyon of the Colorado without food and water from 3 o'clock Sunday until late Monday. More than 800 were forced to remain until the next morning. Their trains were delayed by a wreck.

Dr. S. W. Thomas, editor of the Philadelphia Methodist, arrived from the canyon today. He said:

"Fortunately I was not right in the wreck. About 2:30 o'clock Sunday afternoon seven sections of the delicate special landed in the canyon. Every car was dangerously loaded when the train began the ascent from Williams Junction. The strain was too severe. Several of the engines went dead, and the roadbed gave way, causing a general wreck.

"Away from food and water, without necessary provisions with them, the conference, consisting of 3,000 strong, poured down upon the canyon floor. The manager had expected about 800. He made provision for 1,000, and the consequence was everyone suffered from food and drink. Such a calamity is unprecedented. I believe, in the history of the conference.

"All Sunday afternoon trainmen, hotel hands, ranchers and Methodists helped to construct a new railroad. It was literally a Methodist rail. On its completion depended the lives of the 2,000.

"Sunday night the work was continued. Monday morning found every able-bodied man at the pick and shovel, and so it continued until nearly sundown Monday afternoon. The new rail was built around the wreck, and the first load of worn-out Methodists moved out to the canyon floor. I believe, satisfied to leave the 'air dirt' to others in the future."

RACE FOR THE VICEROY'S CUP

All India Turns Out to the
Blue Ribbon Event of
the Turf.

Calcutta, May 5.—The great sporting event of the year in India is a race for a big silver cup presented by the viceroy and a purse of 20,000 rupees to the winner. The cup is a beautiful example of the work of the Hindu silversmiths, and they are excelled by few. The designs are usually appropriate, and this year it was a trophy worth working for.

The programme showed that about half the entries were by natives. His Royal Highness Aga Khan, the Nawab of Samoilahs, Aga Shah, the Sultan of Johore, and the Highness of Sahib of Patiala, all had horses in the big race. Some of these princes have breeding stables. Others import English, Irish, Australian, American and Arabian thoroughbreds. There was no American horse entered for the viceroy's cup, but the American running stock is usually represented.

Racing in India is an ancient sport. It has been followed for more than a hundred years. Warren Hastings is said to have founded the first breeding stable and introduced Arab stock at Alipore, his country seat. The paddocks in which he bred Arab horses are still used for that purpose, and when he returned to England and retired to Dayleard his country seat, he erected his duplicate and planted around them rare trees from all parts of Asia.

There are two race tracks at Calcutta, one for regular running, the other for steeplechasing, and, as in England and Ireland, the horses are always run on the turf, and most of the riders are gentlemen. A few professional jockeys appear from the stables of breeders who are too old or too fat or too lazy to ride themselves, but it is considered the proper thing for every true sportsman to ride his own horse as long as he is under the saddle. The winner of this year was Col. Waring, an aide-de-camp to the viceroy, and another was a member of the staff of Lord Kitchener.

The tracks are surrounded by lovely landscapes, an easy driving distance from Calcutta, and everywhere in town there was a grand stand and the terraces that surround it were crowded with beautifully dressed women, many of them Pursees, in their lovely costumes, and within the course were more than 50,000 natives, wearing every conceivable color, red and yellow predominating, so that when one looked down upon the inclosure from a distance it resembled a vast flower bed, a field of poppies and roses. The natives take great interest in the races, and, as they are admitted free, every man, woman and child who could leave home was there, and the most of them walked the entire distance from the city.

The viceroy and vice-queen appear in the official old-fashioned barouche, drawn by four horses, with outriders, and escorted by a bodyguard of Sikhs in their uniforms of navy blue, with gold trimmings. The viceroy's box is lined and carpeted with scarlet, and easy chairs were placed for his comfort. Distinguished people came up to pay their respects to him, and Lady Curzon, and between visits he wandered about the field, shaking hands with acquaintances in a democratic fashion and smiling as if he were having the time of his life. It is not after the present viceroy takes a holiday. He is the most industrious man in India, and very few of his subjects are more so. He has taken his recreation in the same fashion, and never does anything in his life that he does not do thoroughly. On the lawn behind the grand stand, under the shade of groups of palm trees, tables were placed where food and tea was served between the events.

Ladies whose husbands are members of the Jockey Club can engage tables in advance, as most of them do, and issue their invitations in advance also, so that viceroy's day is usually a continuous tea party and a reunion of old friends, for everybody within traveling distance chooses the capital that day. Every woman wore a new gown made expressly for the occasion. Most of them were of white or of dainty colors, but they did not compare in beauty or elegance with the brocades and embroidered silks worn by bare-legged natives. Even the Hindu gentlemen present had priceless camels and Cashmere shawls thrown over their shoulders—most of them heirlooms, for, according to the popular impression, modern shawls do not compare in quality with the old ones. Under the shawls they wear long coats, reaching to their heels like ulsters, of lovely figured silk or brocade of brilliant colors. Some of them are finished in exquisite embroidery.

WANT LUMBER TARIFF RAISED

British Columbia Lumbermen
Say They Are Suffering From
American Competition.

Ottawa, May 5.—The most important item under discussion in the House, yesterday, was the lumber duties.

Mr. Morrison, holding a brief for the British Columbia lumbermen, said that they were suffering from the unfair competition of American firms. He said this could be remedied by an increase in the tariff on lumber from the United States.

He also pointed out that the Government would not be disturbed to any extent. He asked the Government to grant immediate relief to the lumbermen of his province, whether it is decided to make a general tariff revision or not.

Mr. Mackie (Nova Scotia) said the lumbermen of British Columbia had formed a combine, which told against the farmer, and for this reason he held them responsible for the tariff.

The Liberal members of the Territories—Messrs. Oliver, Scott, Davis, and Doucette—protested against the reimposition of the duty.

LEAPED 135 FEET

Woman Is First Suicide From New York New Bridge.

New York, May 5.—The first suicide from the new Williamsburg bridge, the grand suspension structure which spans the East River a mile above the old Brooklyn Bridge, was recorded today, when an unknown woman leaped to death in the river 125 feet below.

The woman went on to the bridge from the Brooklyn end. When she neared the center of the bridge she stopped and for a moment stood looking down at the water far below. Two policemen diving her purpose, ran towards her, but she stepped from the roadway to the open ironwork, walked a few feet along the narrow girder and then, with a scream, jumped.

As she shot down feet foremost, her skirts filled, forming a sort of parachute, and just before reaching the water her body turned and she went into the river headfirst. The officers shouted and blew their whistles to attract the crew of a tug, which was passing within 20 feet of the woman, but they were unsuccessful, and she was drowned. The woman is described as having been five feet tall and about 110 pounds in weight.
