KILLED OFFICER AND FLED
Nen and Bloodhounds Out After Pennsylvania Desperado.

Newcastle, Pa., Aug. 18. — Patrolman Frank Skidmore was shot and instantly killed, and Patrolman John Atkinson wounded, while attempting to arrest Roswell Waite in the outskirts of Newcastle. Waite escaped and is supposed to be in hiding among the rocks near the railroad. He is armed.

As soon as the killing was learned, a posse of deputies were hastily sworn in and armed, bloodhounds were telephoned for, and Troop F of the National Guard, was ordered out. Poses of heavily armed men surrounded the place in which Waite is believed to be hidden. Skidmore and Atkinson were sent for about 8 o'clock last night to arrest Waite, who was raising a disturbance in his mother's house. Will Get a Second Report On Cost of a Breakwater

Council's Committee Has Another Tussle With West London Question.

Two hours were consumed by the breakwater committee of the city council last night in arriving at a conclusion which would have been reached in fifteen minutes had it not been for a warm discussion. The trouble was all about Engineer Graydon. Mr. Frank Jones, one of the West London ratepayers committee, was opposed to the claim that the engineer was prejudicial against a breakwater. On account of the dissatisfaction which appeared among some of the West London committee members, the proposal was not altogether satisfactory.
