London's conceded position as tradbids fair to be greatly strengthened in city enjoys trade by the steam roads. The construction of interurban electric lines to a city of London's size and importance will no doubt bring a greater benefit to retail trade than has accrued from any previous addition to our means of ingress. That the construction of electric roads has everywhere given a great impetus to the trade of the large city from which such roads radiate is well known, and when London has two or three such roads our merchants will get an immense amount of business now turned into other channels through lack of convenient and cheap means of running into the city from the surrounding country.

A well-known Londoner who recently visited Indianapolis, Ind., says that surprising results have been obtained pertinent to the present situation: from the interurban system recently completed there. Eight distinct radial railways comprise the system, each reaching out for about 75 miles from the hub at Indianapolis. Carefully prepared statistics compiled by an interested association of retail merchants show that each of these roads brings into that city about \$250,000 per month of trade formerly done elsewhere-a total somewhere in the neighborhood of \$25,000,000 per year. 50,000,000 Bushel Mark.

Winnipeg, Dec. 4.—The close of November has brought the results of the first three months of the crop year, and also brought within sight the close of navigation, so that grain figures are ecoming more and more interesting. The marketings at interior elevators have now reached the 50,000,000 bushel mark, and of this amount 32,061,250 bushels have passed inspection at Winnipeg and possibly some 100,000 bushels have been marketed on the American side and have gone out from the Port of Duluth under Minnesota inspection The amount marketed is nearly double that up to the same date of last year and the inspections exceed those of last year by 10.933,000 bushels. These figures are all based on the allowance of 1,050 bushels per car. At least 4,-250.000 bushels will be required for seed. so that 66,000,000 bushels of the crop is already accounted for. This very far exceeds the amount accounted for at this date last year, when only 21.127.500 bushels had passed inspection and less than 30,000,000 bushels had been marketed. The surplus in farmers' hands for sale is probably between 15,000,000 and 20,000,000 bushels, so that there does not seem to be any need for alarm that the heavy surplus will bear the market to any great extent.
