BRITISH ENGINEERS SEE LONDON SIGHTS

Are Getting Impressed With Ontario and Surprised at Its Possibilities.

ONLY HEAR OF WEST

In the Old Land—German "War Scare" Is Strangely Confined to Certain Quarters, They Say.

A party of six engineering students from the University of London, England, spent Sunday in the city, sight-seeing, and looking into local conditions from an engineering standpoint. They were in charge of Mr. H. M. Clougher, formerly of Toronto, but now of England.

The engineers are: Mr. H. M. Clougher, London; Mr. S. Holcroft, Swindon; Mr. T. W. Wragg, Sheffield; J. Weyman Mason, Tunbridge Wells; J. Dalish, Tunbridge Wells, and D. Reeve Smith, London.

A Luncheon.

They arrived here at 6:25 p.m. Saturday from Sarnia, where they were moving through the tunnel, and visited other works in that city. Owing to the storm they did not venture out on Saturday night, but yesterday afternoon they were kept busy seeing the sights.

A luncheon was tendered the visitors at the London Club on Saturday evening by Mayor Stuyvesant and Mr. A. T. McMahon, president of the board of trade, doing the honors.

Visiting in Ontario.

The party will not visit Western Canada, spending practically all of the time in the city. This morning they went to Brantford, going from thence to Hamilton, then to Toronto, where they will spend the day, and on Sunday, returning home about the middle of September.

They are all deeply interested with Ontario, and unanimously declare that this section of the country at least has a wonderful future.

The great surprise to us is Eastern Canada, not Western Canada," said Mr. Mason, one of the party. "We are always impressed with Western Canada, its possibilities and its richness. We have that literally dimmed into our ears at all times, and we hear very little of the eastern part. We have the impression that Canada is a large farm, with practically little else. Consequently, we are more than surprised at the possibilities of this part of your land. I should say that you are destined to have a remarkable future. It is beyond all our comprehension. The possibilities of power development at Niagara are stupendous, and about it should develop a marvellously rich manufacturing district. The possibility of water-power exploitation is something new to us, and I can assure you we are vastly impressed with it."

Ontario Is Great.

"Ontario is great. Its future will be great. We spent some time in the Cobalt, a wonderfully rich country. We saw some of the remarkably rich mines there, and we were impressed with its richness."

"Muskeoka we found extremely delightful, a most pleasant holiday spot. The scenery was truly magnificent. Everywhere we have seen many things to admire, and much to learn."

"We have seen most royally treated since coming over the hospitality of the Canadian people is very fine. There are great opportunities here for the development of the country for distinction and wealth. I like it very much."

The War Scare.

"What about the German war scare?" was asked. "It is largely confined to some newspapers and politicians," he answered. "The hotelmen are not at all nervous. They are not at all except these people. The great masses are not worrying, and I do not see why they should do so either."

He also said he knew nothing of the mysterious North Coast Railroad now building west from Spokane and that as far as he knew it has no connection with his company.

Lenox, Mass., Aug. 30.—Around the central proposition of making Bermuda the winter centre for horse racing by establishing an extensive race track at Hamilton, the Bermuda Company, Limited, of Canada, the formation of which was announced here today, has already progressed in a general project aiming to exploit the island and make extensive improvements.

YOUTH DROWNED WITH FATHER NEAR BY

Norman McLinden Walks Out on Wheel Beam of Detroit Ferry and Falls In.

Detroit, Aug. 30.—When his father, Robert McLinden, 64 Erie street, Windsor, called by in the Grand Trunk transport Lansdowne, Norman McLinden, 20 years old, a deckhand on the Grand Trunk transport Great Western, was drowned off that boat about 3:30 o'clock yesterday morning. The accident happened about 100 feet out in the river from slip No. 1, near the Grand Trunk depot in Windsor.

After the Great Western had got out in the stream her engine stopped and it became necessary for a part of the crew to go out on the paddle box and get the big paddle wheel again in motion. Engineer Carney, with four others, had gone out and the boy followed, walking along the wheel beam. He either missed his footing in the darkness or he lost his balance.

None of the others knew he was coming and the first intimation of danger was when a loud splash and a despairing cry for help were heard. An effort was made at rescue, but the body was seen no more. Lanterns were procured and the men looked for a long time over the side of the boat, but all in vain.

ATHENS TRANQUIL

Greek Government Pardons Soldiers Engaged in Recent Mutiny.

Athens, Greece, Aug. 29.—The crisis in political affairs here, which reached its height in the mutiny of the local garrison and the formation of a new cabinet, has subsided. A decree was granted today granting amnesty to the troops concerned in the military movement and those who have been encamped outside of the city for the past 24 hours, numbering 48, returned this afternoon to their respective barracks. They were addressed by their leader, Coo Zorbas.

The city is tranquil. It is stated that the crown prince will resign as chief in command of the army. Among the reforms demanded by the troops were that the general command of the army should be entrusted to three officers of the rank of general, acting under the supreme authority of a royal prince, the other members of the royal family serving in the army to be treated as ordinary officers; that foreign officers shall be appointed to organize the army and navy, the latter to be strengthened by an ironclad and eight destroyers. Protest was also made against the maintenance of several royal yachts, it being contended that one for the King's use was sufficient.
