Augusta, Ga., March 14.-Brooklyn seems, at first glance, almost hopeless as National League pennant contender. The surprise is to find the training camp of the Dodgers full of hope and enthusiasm and with a spirit that has existed in a Brooklyn team only once in the last decade, and that for a short time

Probing more deeply into the makeup of the Dodgers, one is surprised to find that it has the framework of a pennantwinning team. Given consistent pitching, a shortstop, and Brooklyn looms up as one of the pennant contenders. Man for man today (with pitchers eliminated), carries a club a long way. Brooklyn has a stronger team than the

The worst fault of the Brooklyn team has been the abnormal laziness or carelessness of its pitchers, and the same fault commenced to crop up almost be-fore the team had landed in its training camp here. Much of this was due to careless management of Dahlen during the last few years. Dahlen did not compel the pitchers to do the fielding that all winning pitchers should do.

Shortstop looks like the weakest spot on the team. Joe Tinker, lost by Ebbetts' tinkering, would have made the team look much stronger. Neither Egan nor Cutshaw can play short, and neither wants to try it-which makes it necessary to find a shortstop from the new material. The catching department is fair, with

no sign of additional strength.
