NOT NEEDED IN BELGIUM

indicated in a Reuter dispatch from Athens, published this morning, stating that the first detachment of troops forming the Allies' military expedition, including Canadians and Senegalese, has arrived and landed at the Straits of Dardanelles. It has frequently been stated that

Canada's cavalry with the first contingent would go to Egypt, as oper ations in France and Belgium at the present time were not open to the work of mounted troops. The "extra divisional" mounted troops with the contingent are the

Royal Canadian Dragoons, from Toronto and St. Johns; Quebec, the Strathcona Horse, from Winnipeg, and Royal Canadian Horse Artillery from Kingston, Ont. All these corps are regulars but


