WESTERN ONTARIO FIRMS TO BOOST EXPORT BUSINESS

District Organization Will Be Effected Here On June 15.

As the outcome of a meeting of the directors of the local Chamber of Commerce with representatives of several different firms in this city around a luncheon table in the Tecumseh House at noon Thursday, the movement originated in this city to increase export trade, will be extended to all Western Ontario. It was unanimously decided to invite the export managers of all business concerns in Western Ontario to confer in this city about June 15, so that a strong organization may be effected. The meeting Thursday was well attended and much enthusiasm was displayed. It was the belief of practically everyone present that much could be done by closer co-operation between the different firms to increase the export business. It was pointed out also that any increase in the exports would have a tendency to decrease the present adverse rate of exchange. If possible, meetings similar to the one planned for June 15 will be held from time to time for the exchanging of ideas and the comparing of notes.

MRS. DAVID KILGOUR BURIED AT WOODLAND

Was Very Active Worker in Christian Church and W. C. T. U.

Sudden and unexpected death removed one of East London's well-known residents in the person of Mrs. David F. Kilgour, 806 Dundas street. Bringing in her usual health on Sunday last, she had attended church service both morning and evening. Shortly after retiring, she became quite ill, and an hour and a half later died from an attack of heart failure. She was an active member of the Dundas Street Christian Church and also of the W. C. T. U. Born in Scotland in 1850, she came to this country with her parents at an early age, and settled in Fergus, Ont., where she lived until her marriage in 1873. Nearly twenty years of her married life were spent in Arthur, Ont., where a family of five were born, three of whom died in early childhood. In 1895 the family moved to London, where the deceased had lived until her death. She is survived by her husband, a daughter, Mrs. (Dr.) W. H. Cameron, Coniston, Ont.; a son, W. H. Kilgour, Ottawa, Ont.; a sister, Mrs. H. Smellie, Sudbury, Ont.; and a brother, David T. Murray, Winnipeg, Man. The funeral was held from her late residence, 806 Dundas street, on Thursday afternoon, interment being made at Woodland Cemetery. Services at the house were conducted by Rev. J. H. Versey of the Christian Church, assisted by Rev. W. J. Hastie, formerly of London. The pallbearers were C. B. King, Henry Watson, W. J. Crocker, F. Ball, W. Torrance and R. J. Henderson, all of this city.

HUMANE SOCIETY IN ONE MONTH CARES FOR 300 ANIMALS

Inspector Tustin Declares Heartless People Leaving City Desert Pets.

Inspector George Tustin of the London Humane Society, at a meeting in the city hall last evening, reported that 300 animals had been cared for so far this month. Of this number 146 were horses, 37 cows, 20 pigs and the remainder dogs and cats. There were 60 stray dogs cared for, and it is thought by the inspector that these were owned by people who leave the city or farmers who bring them to town and leave them. Mr. Tustin said that if the owners of the animals could be found they were liable to a heavy penalty. He asserted that if any person was leaving the city and did not wish to take their dog or cat, he would look after it. His phone number is 104. The new pound has been completed, and there is now accommodation for 50 dogs. There still are lacking the proper facilities for destroying diseased animals. He stated that he had destroyed 35 during the month by chloroform. This he thought was not a good method. He reported that there were 100 boys and girls from Victoria and Wharncliffe road public schools and Askin Street Methodist Church enrolled as members of the society, and expected a large number from the Boys' Naval Brigade today.

SECOND ARREST OVER BIDDULPH LIQUOR SEIZURE

Fred Mason of London Taken Into Custody by Provincial Officer.

Fred Mason, a young London man, street address unknown, according to Provincial Officer Palmer, who arrested him in a downtown barber shop about 5 o'clock Thursday afternoon, is being held in the county jail to face a charge of fraud in the same case as Police Constable Roy Brammer, before Squire Chittick in the county police court today. Mason was taken before Squire Chittick following his arrest last night, and remanded for trial. In addition to the wrongful seizure of liquor from a Biddulph farmer while impersonating provincial officers, which is one of the allegations against Brammer and Mason, they are also charged with having secured \$150 in cash and \$250 additional in the form of a check and "hush money," on promising to bring no charges against the farmer.
