CLAIMS LETTER GIVES CLUE TO SMALL TRAGEDY

Montreal Hotel Man Makes Public "Message From Wife of Kidnapper."

THEATRE MAN DRUGGED

Private Detectives Declare Missing Magnate Was Hidden in Cellar.

MONTREAL, June 23.—Important

light on the mystery of the disappearance of Ambrose Small, the Toronto theatrical millionaire who vanished on Dec. 2, 1919, was revealed today by a Montreal hotel keeper who made public a letter evidently written by the wife of one of the men engaged in kidnapping the millionaire.

Other documents discovered by the hotel keeper in the baggage of a man and woman who claimed to come from Rochester, N. Y., and who disappeared, were investigated by a Toronto private detective, and led to the belief that Small was drugged and brought in an automobile unconscious to Montreal, where he was thrown into the cellar of a house.

Georges Henri Chénier, president of the company which owns the Vigor Square Hotel, 356 Craig street east, claims to be in possession of the documents which designate it as being beyond all doubt, one of the kidnappers of the Ontario theatrical magnate.

Written by Woman.

One of the letters was, it appears, written by a woman, who was afterwards arrested in New Brunswick, where she declared to a policeman that she traveled in the automobile.

According to Chénier, the letter in which Small was the chauffeur of the machine, which took the road to Montreal.

On arrival here the unconscious form of the millionaire was deposited in the cellar of a large house. The millionaire, she affirmed, seemed to her to be under the effect of a powerful narcotic. He did not speak during the whole journey, and allowed himself to be lifted out of the automobile with the docility of a child.

The representative of a private detective agency, according to information furnished by Mr. Chénier, expects the veil of mystery to be raised soon.

In this case Mr. Chénier will be in line to receive a large part of the \$50,000 reward offered to anyone able to help in discovering the millionaire.

According to Chénier, a man and woman who gave the name of Dr. and Mrs. Gray, registered October 6, 1921, at the Vigor Square Hotel and occupied room No. 21. They said they came from Rochester, N. Y., but Mr. Chénier is able to state that the automobile which they traveled in bore an Ontario license number, "27-539, Ontario, 1921." The couple spent a week here.

Deposits House Plan.

The husband requested Mr. Chénier to deposit in his safe the plan of a house in Toronto, and warned him that this document was very precious.

On the back of this plan he could read the name of the architect, S. B. Coon, 25 Toronto street, Toronto.

The following day Dr. and Mrs. Gray left the hotel in order, they said, to take a walk. They had left their automobile in the Vigor Garage, St. Louis street, corner of Boncourt street. Before leaving they offered to sell their automobile, but found no buyers. They then set off towards the postoffice, where they renewed their attempts to sell their car. The postmaster, who was afraid he was dealing with automobile thieves, asked them to wait, telling them he would have to consult one of his brothers. He went to the telephone and got into communication with the detective office.

On hearing him the two strangers at once disappeared in the automobile.

The following evening Chénier was surprised not to see his guests return, so he deposited in a safe place all that belonged to the two travelers, photographs and baggage, ticketing the lot with \$700, the amount due to the Vigor Square Hotel.

He thought no more of the couple until six months later, when, on the 22nd of April last, a private detective from Toronto registered at this hotel.

Examined Baggage.

Chénier spoke to him of Mr. and Mrs. Gray, whereupon the detective drew out a notebook and showed the name of the husband written there, adding that it was implicated in the affair of Ambrose Small. They then examined the baggage of the travelers and found some notebooks containing addresses which the detective noted carefully, saying that with them he would probably be able to clear up the mystery of the disappearance of the millionaire.

In the grips they found amongst other things a letter written by the wife to one of her friends and which she had not had time to post. In this letter she said her husband had been mixed up in the Ambrose Small affair.

The letter read as follows:

"Dear Martha: Gray is still in trouble. I fear that he will be suspected everywhere he goes. I have
