JOHN MITCHELL BURIED

CAYUGA, Aug. 17.—Alexander Mitchell attended the funeral of his brother, John Mitchell, in Jarvis on Thursday.
The late Mr. Mitchell was born in

Scotland 88 years ago, but came to Canada when 23 years of age. The first work he did in Canada was helping to dig the foundation of the Presbyterian Church at Clansburgh. His wife died two years ago, and seven children survive. With the exception of Mrs. R. Jeffries, who resides in Toronto, all his family live within a short distance of his old home.

WILL PROBE CAUSE OF DEATH OF GIRL

Buffalo Surgeon To Question Father in Hope of Ascribing Motive.

STRATFORD, Aug. 17.—Relatives went to Buffalo shortly after noon today to claim the body of Irene Purcell, aged 18, of Stratford, which was found floating yesterday morning in Niagara River near Grand Island ferry dock.

Identification was made last night by Fred C. Du Pernel of 79 Ross avenue, Buffalo, at whose home the girl was staying. Du Pernel informed police the girl had been acting queerly of late, but that he did not know what caused her strange actions.

Medical Examiner Long said today that he would question the girl's father in hope that he may ascribe some motive for her actions.

Dr. Long said he had not learned whether she left any notes or anything else explaining her act.

Du Pernel said he saw the girl at 7 o'clock yesterday morning when he started for work. Her body was discovered in the river at least three miles away about an hour later.

Two men who were dynamiting for fish found the body, which had been in the water only a few minutes. The blast brought it to the surface. Dr. Long stated that he believed no autopsy necessary, as there was no indication that the girl had met with foul play.

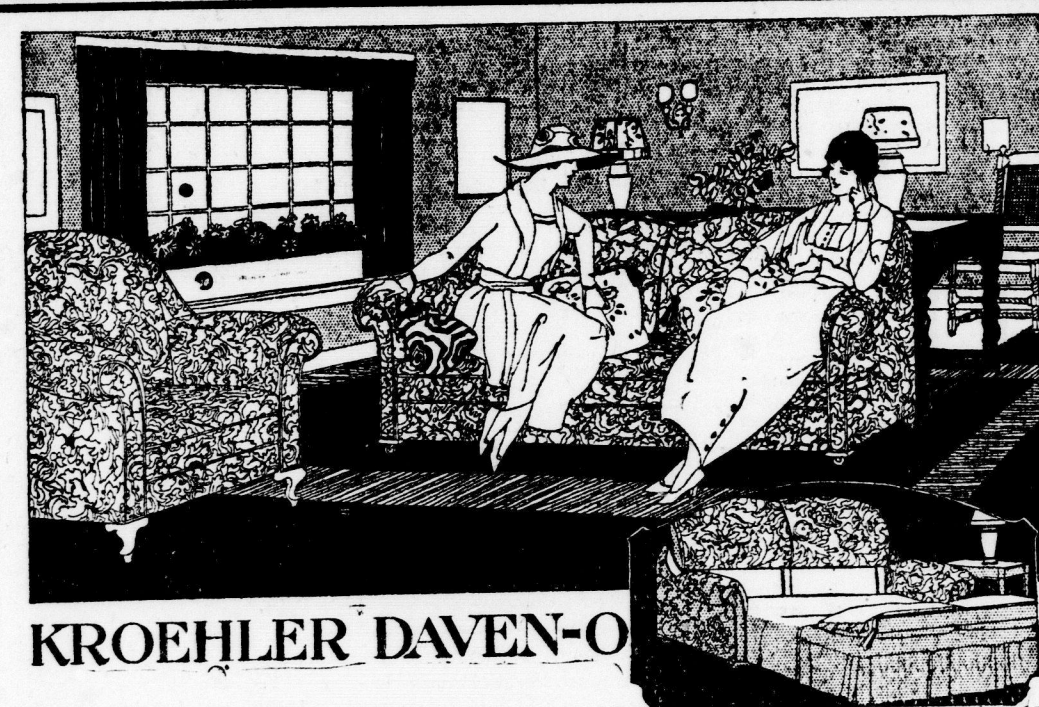
