Majority of Members of Reparations Commission Opposed To Poincare's Plan.

Paris, Nov. 28 .- Although the majority of the members of the reparations commission are opposed to Premier Poincare's plan for direct action for the collection of the German indemnity, there is a growing will soon be in a position where it will be forced to take independent measures against Germany.

This impression is based on the uncertainty as to whether the proposed inter-allied financial conference at Brussels will actually take place, and the still greater uncertainty over the prospects of agreement if the meeting is called.

Following the announcement of the cabinet's plan for occupation of the Ruhr district in the event France does not obtain satisfaction before Tchitcherin, the Russian Soviet for-January 15, the meeting of premiers, eign minister, arrived here today which will probably be held in Paris from Moscow. He said he favored early next week, has assumed con-

Poincare Has Plan.

M. Poincare has a definite plan to place before the premiers, and espe-cially before Mr. Bonar Law. This Bowman was possibly "fed up" with cancellation of the French debt to Great Britain. It also contemplates raising a large international loan, half to be devoted to stabilization of the German mark and the remainder to payment of reparations to France.

A moratorium of several years would be accorded Germany, but the most rigid guarantees would be exacted, and a commission on reparations would exercise complete control of Germany's finances.

The Associated Press was informed

by members of the French delegation tonight that unless such a plan is substantially agreed to by the allies, France will "take the only other course open to her, namely seizure of the products of the Ruh and absolute control of the French

Total collapse of Germany, financially and industrially, would immediately follow the carrying out of such a scheme, it is contended, and the net result would be that France would get little or nothing and would ruin her own credit in the bargain.
