VISIT LONDON CENTERLarge Number of Essays by
School Children Ready
For Examination.

The members of St. Thomas center of the Canadian college of organists were the guests of the London local center last evening. The meeting was held in Dr. L. Balogh's studio at the St. Peter's Parish hall, and the St. Thomas visitors were greeted by Dr. Jas. H. Smith, chairman of the London center, C.C.O. The St. Thomas organists were especially interested in the report on the organ recital for school children, given recently in St. Andrew's church under the auspices of the London center by arrangement with the board of education.

It was reported that a large number of essays had been received in which the children had given their own impressions of the recital. A committee was appointed to deal with the matter of awarding prizes for the best six essays written. After the business a debate took place on the subject of "broadcasting church services." J. Parnell Morris, A.C.C.O., being "pro" leader, and Dr. Jas. H. Smith "con" leader. The St. Thomas organists joined in the debate, and some instructive points were given dealing with both sides of the question.

During the social hour which followed the organists were favored with a few selections played on a Bosendorfer piano by Paul de Marky. He played Etude in A flat (Schubert), Etude in G sharp minor (Chopin), and Berceuse in D flat (Chopin). Before leaving by the last train for their homes the St. Thomas organists expressed themselves as being delighted with the pleasant evening spent with their London colleagues, and made the request that in the near future the London organists make a return visit. 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PROFANITY IN WOMEN IS
ATTACKED BY JULIA HOYTSays It Always Leaves a Bad
Impression—Men
Abhor It.

ONLY A BAD HABIT

My family will volubly testify, I am sure, to the fact that I am not old-fashioned. I preface my article with this because some people may think it sounds out-of-date to say that I was decidedly shocked the other day when I heard a young girl use profane language. Swear-words are words that most of us probably have learned, willingly or unwillingly. We cannot help but hear them at times. Just set into a bad traffic mix-up on one of our crowded city streets, and you will receive a very thorough lesson.

However, there are lots of things which we know but of which we do not make use, and I am still unprogressive enough to think that profanity, whether we hear it from a man or woman, is ugly and unattractive—consequently better eliminated. In addition it is a very easy habit to form and so better controlled at the start.

Gives Bad Impression.

Swearing does not necessarily prove the person who uses it to be loose in his actions, but it does give a rather bad impression, and I think most people receive a jolt when they hear it. In addition, I have never yet heard swear words used in any enormous effect. They may give relief to the person, I do not know; but they do not add any weight to an argument, and as a proof of less of temper, they are a sign of weakness. We can understand that men whose vocabulary is rather limited may resort to this means of impressing their adversaries, but in most people it is a sign of ignorance and of a lack of sensitiveness.

There are moments, undoubtedly, when "cursing" gives great relief to one's feelings. I can think of one instance when I not only sympathized with the swearer, but when I wished very much that I could use some good strong swear-words myself. The night that I opened in a play in Chicago our scenery arrived only an hour and a half before the time that the curtain was to ring up. It had to be cut and adapted to the stage and the result was that we rang up exactly an hour late.

As I stood on the stage and watched the poor stage hands sweating and working like dogs trying to get the scenery ready, I was more than sympathetic with the loud profanity I heard around me. But I am not discussing instances such as these, but "profanity" when used in conversation, as I heard it the other day.

Do It Mentally.

I repeat that, though we know when thinking logically that swearing is not necessarily a proof of poor morals, we are not always logical, and we cannot help but be disagreeably impressed by any girl or woman who uses this kind of language. Consequently, if only from the angle of whether or not one wants to make a pleasant and agreeable impression on others, which I presume most of us do, I should strongly advise girls, if they must swear, to do so mentally, but not to make it audible.

If there are some who think that profanity in women amuses or appeals to men, or that it in any way makes men like them better, let me tell them that, from my knowledge, it is pretty sure to do exactly the opposite. Men at heart are perhaps more conventional than women, and rarely find a man who likes to hear a woman swear. So, I repeat, as it is difficult to break a habit when once formed, it is better never to allow this one to start.
