

WORK ON SEWAGE PLANT TO START IMMEDIATELY

Syphon System in South London Will Cost \$100,000.

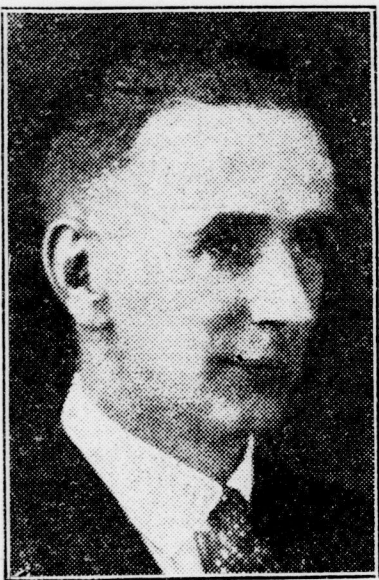
McBRIDE FAVORED

Local Man Recommended For Post of Building Inspector.

Commencement of work on a \$100,000 sewage syphon system in South London was ordered by No. 2 committee of the city council in session last night. Work will be undertaken as soon as plans are complete. Payment for the big job will come from a fund accumulated from percentages of local improvement taxes. Over \$80,000 has already been accumulated, and the city can secure a mandatory order from the provincial board of health to go on with the work.

The construction of this duplicate system will mean much progress in the city's efforts to improve the sewage disposal equipment. The new syphon will be 4,000 feet in length, and will be constructed from 48-inch pipe. The existing syphon is only a 20-inch affair, and cannot adequately handle sewage disposal. Will Augment Equipment.

The sewage syphon system will augment a disposal equipment that

is rapidly becoming one of the most efficient in the country. The quarter-million dollar Wellington-High street sewer system installed last year and the \$80,000 Pottersburg sewer this year, the pumping station and sewage disposal plant in South London will all be contributing factors to the concentrated move to provide efficient sanitation.

T. C. McBride, son of a local architect, will be recommended for the vacant post of building inspector at a salary of \$2,500. This is an increase of \$300 over the salary paid A. M. Piper, who until October last held the post.

The name of E. K. O'Connor, assistant inspector, was brought forward by Ald. Harry Bottrell, chairman, and by Ald. F. B. Kilbourne. However, the mayor's motion to appoint Mr. McBride was supported and finally made unanimous.

Plan Sidewalks. Decision was made to put in sidewalks on Wharncliffe road south. Sidewalks will be constructed on the east side from Elmwood avenue to the city limits, and on the west side from the existing walk to Elmwood avenue. "Somebody's neck might be broken there some night," declared Ald. Bottrell, in supporting the scheme to build up the thoroughfare.

Residents to the north of the Carling creek threatened, through legal representatives, to enter an injunction against the city if work was gone on with in tilling in the drainage system there. It was decided to let

the work drop, as it is on private property.

Property adjacent to Front street will be expropriated in order to secure land for the construction of a sewage disposal plant. The land is now low lying property, frequently flooded, and of little use for other purposes. The title is now questioned and the only manner in which the city can secure the property is to expropriate it.

Ald. F. B. Kilbourne asked that more lights be placed on the south end of the Ridout street bridge. He stated that several ladies, who had been modest by strangers, had spoken to him about the darkened passageway. The matter will be taken up at No. 1 committee tonight.

The committee decided to revert back to the old hour of 5:15 o'clock in the afternoon for its fortnightly meetings.

Ray & Co., London, were awarded the contract to supply 20 overall uniforms for members of the city street cleaning squad. These uniforms are of a white and blue material and will offer protection to the men on the street. Each uniform will cost \$3.75.

DECLARATION OF SANITY SOUGHT BY EX-PRIEST

Declares Romanism Railroaded Him To Asylum—Life Not Own.

Canadian Press Despatch. Toronto, April 15.—Rev. Father James Minehan, former parish priest at Dixie, Ont., who appeared at Osgoode hall yesterday under a writ of habeas corpus to claim his release from the hospital for the insane here, was ordered by Mr. Justice Mowat to be examined by an outside physician.

Father Minehan claims he was improperly committed in the first place, and had been sent to an institution in Montreal, which he left for Toronto "to vindicate himself." While here he was committed to the local institution.

Speaking on his own behalf, he said: "I am quite competent to speak for myself. Last June an order went forth to the effect that I was incapable of looking after my own affairs. I was given no opportunity to refute that. I was in Montreal at the time and was not allowed to write to my own lawyer. That is Romanism in Quebec. You can't call your life your own down there. I got no chance to defend myself. That is Quebec in the city of Montreal, and it is in Canada, unfortunately."

She is survived by her husband, two sons, Frank and William, both of this city, and two daughters, Mrs. Forrester of this city, and Mrs. Andrews of Port Arthur.

The funeral date has not yet been announced, as word from the daughter living in Port Arthur is awaited. Rev. L. W. Reid will conduct the services. Interment will be made in Mount Pleasant cemetery.
