

STOLEN CAR FOUND IN ST. CLAIR RIVER

Police Believe It Driven in Water To Conceal Theft.

Sarnia, July 15.—A car, which was found submerged in the St. Clair river at Point Edward late last night, has been identified as one stolen in Toronto. It is believed that the car was driven directly from Toronto to Sarnia and thence to Point Edward, and then purposely driven into the bay to hide the theft and allow the party or parties to make a getaway before it was discovered. Police have also formed the opinion that the thief crossed the border to Michigan after abandoning the car. It was in the water at a point almost directly west of Bayview park inside the south end of the point.

KING EXPLODES RUMORS ON ELECTION IN CANADA

Announces at Conclusion of Cabinet Meeting That Country May Rest Assured There Will Be No Announcement of Dissolution of Parliament For "Good Time To Come."

ROUTINE MATTERS DISCUSSED AT MEETING

Ottawa, July 15.—Premier Mackenzie King said this evening that there would be no decision in regard to an election for some time to come. The prime minister made this statement at the conclusion of a cabinet meeting which was attended by but five members of the government. Mr. King said that the meeting had been called for the purpose of disposing of a number of routine matters which have accumulated during the ten days' respite of the cabinet. "When will the next meeting of the cabinet be held?" he was asked. "Not for a couple of weeks," he replied. When asked whether there had been any decision in regard to the calling of a general election, the prime minister laughed. "You may be quite sure of one thing. There won't be any decision in regard to an election for a good time to come," he replied.

HOSPITAL INMATE IS UNDER ARREST

Walter J. Land in Custody On Charge of Forgery at Essex.

St. Thomas, July 15.—While a patient in the Memorial Hospital, St. Thomas, suffering from an injury to the leg, Walter J. Land, a former resident of this district, was placed under arrest by Chief John Patterson, of the Essex police force, who states that Land is wanted at Essex on a charge of forgery. Chief Patterson is making every effort to have Land released from the hospital, as attending physicians state he has practically recovered from his injury. Hospital attendants have been instructed to look up the patient's clothing, and if necessary at any time, prevent him from leaving the hospital. Land is alleged to have forged checks on his former employer, William Heneman, a farmer near Essex, and secured about \$350 in cash for them.

He was a pupil at Elmira school. His parents, and a sister, Jean, survive. Funeral services will be conducted at the late residence at 3 o'clock on Saturday. Interment will be in St. Thomas mausoleum.

Fine Assessed.

Frank Matthews, aged 33 years, of Port Burwell, was fined \$100 and \$250 by Magistrate Maxwell, in the Port Burwell police court, for a breach of the venereal diseases prevention act. He was convicted of supplying medicine to a young girl who was arraigned on a charge of vagrancy, and on her plea of guilty, was committed to the Alexandra Home for Girls at Toronto, for an indeterminate period.

On Out Bail.

Harvey Milne, a youth of the village, was also charged with having improper relations with the girl. He elected to be tried by a jury, and was released in \$4,000 bail.

Sentence Suspended.

George Kyle, a Bayham farmer, was charged with assaulting his wife, occasioning bodily harm. He was released on suspended sentence for three months on payment of costs.

JURY NOW CONSIDERS POISONED CANDY CASE

Will Decide Whether Aged Suitor of Former Sarnia Girl Is Guilty.

Detroit, July 15.—The fate of Charles Henderson, aged suitor of Miss Louise Havers, formerly of Sarnia, Ont., and former room-clerk at the Book Cadillac hotel, who is accused of sending the girl a box of poison candy, was placed in the hands of a jury. The state attempted during the trial to show that Henderson sent the poison candy to Miss Havers, as well as several anonymous letters in which he threatened to kill her. Witnesses were also introduced to show that Henderson had purchased candy and an attempt made to show that the accused man was the author of the anonymous letters. The defence was based upon an effort to shift the blame away from Henderson onto the shoulders of an employee of the Mexican consulate.

Today he admitted to newspapermen that he was going to Ottawa to talk the matter over with a girl he met when he came to Canada three months ago, a girl he liked so much that it only needed this providential release from poverty to make him anxious to marry her. Ferguson's pockets are filled with letters from women offering to become his wife.

OUTLOOK IS DARK FOR COAL SUPPLY

Former Fuel Controller Urges Canadians To Fill Bins Immediately.

Ottawa, July 15.—"Canadians will be well advised to get in a sufficient supply of whatever fuel he proposes to use next winter, without loss of time." This is the advice given today by C. A. Magrath, who was fuel controller during the war, and who had to do with arrangements looking to the protection of Canadians' interests in the big hard coal strike of 1922. "Seldom has the fuel outlook seemed so threatening as at the present time," says Mr. Magrath.

FOUR FOREST FIRES RAGING IN ALBERTA

Great Conflagrations Reported by Calgary Forestry Branch.

Calgary, Alta., July 15.—Four great forest fires were burning on Tuesday in a big triangle of country that has as its corners McGillivray, Sparwood and Loon, it is reported by the forestry branch in Calgary. The fires were blazing high, and could be seen through the smoke from an altitude of 7,000 feet, at which altitudes from the High River station were flying.

AGED FARMER FINED FOR THREATENING MAN

John Nelson, 77, Found Guilty of Technical Assault at Strathroy.

Strathroy, July 15.—John Nelson, a farmer on 4th line, Adelaide, was found guilty of a technical assault by Magistrate Tryon in police court here this afternoon. The complaint was laid by William Shepherd, a neighbor of Nelson's. Shepherd was driving along the road in his car accompanied by his young son, Lyle, on the evening of the 8th, meeting Nelson, who was driving cows home. Some argument arose over various business transactions between them. Shepherd allowed that Nelson became very angry, brandished a knife and threatened to cut his heart out. Nelson denied the knife part of the episode, claiming it was a piece of cow chain he held in his hand. Shepherd's story was confirmed by the boy's statement, and the magistrate fined Nelson \$5 and costs, and bound him over in \$200 to keep the peace for a year. Crown Attorney Judd prosecuted.

MARITIMES PARLEY NATIONAL IN VIEW

Economic Conference Opens in Moncton—Subjects Are Chosen.

Moncton, July 15.—The maritime economic conference, meeting here today with the expressed purpose of dealing with national problems in a national way, decided to appoint committees to make intensive studies of transportation, industrial development, immigration and the economic status of these provinces under the confederation agreement. The committees will report at a future meeting in Charlottetown when a definite case concerning these problems as seen in this part of Canada will be drawn up for submission to a national economic conference planned for Winnipeg this fall. A keynote was given to the meeting shortly after its opening by A. M. Belding, Saint John, who said in part: "While we represent the maritime provinces we meet also as Canadians, anxious to promote national unity and believing that what we will submit to representatives of other divisions of Canada will make for national as well as local prosperity and unity. 'If, however, any one among us entertains a thought of introducing politics, I am sure you will all agree with me that his train is waiting.'"
