R. Menzies, secretary of the local branch

of the Communist party. The question arose over a petition by the Communist party to the board against religious teaching, cadet train-ing and homework. The board unanimsly declined to recognize the party and the petition was returned to the secretary without comment.

In replying to the statement, Mr.
Menzies said: "I would like to point out

to Rev. Mr. Mess that the Communist party of Canada is a legal party, working under the Canadian constitution and employing only constitutiona methods in advocating the necessities methods in advocating the necessities for a change in the present system of society." Referring to the statement by Mr. Mess in regards to the letter not being signed by a ratepayer, Mr. Menzies stated that the communication was signed by a ratepayer, and all the members of the Communist workers who eventually pay all the

workers who excitating pays rates and taxes.

"As far as recognizing the Communist party," he declared, "the board showed by their actions that they were forced to recognize that there is such a thing as a Communist party. We will continue to use all the constitutional means within our power to better the conditions of the working class. "We are willing to debate the quesboard," he stated.
