COUNCIL WILL NOW SEEK APPROVAL OF 1923 PACT

Aldermen Would Stay by Agreement As Other Efforts Fail.

DEMANDS ARE REFUSED

Street Railway Company Declines To Pay Cost in Full.

London's city councillors are going to tell their transportation troubles to Premier Howard Ferguson and his associates. It is generally conceded that Mayor Wenige and his 1923 colleagues, technically, have done those things which they ought not to have done, and the major problem now is to find the easiest way out.

Meeting in special session yesterday afternoon the majority of the councillors decided that the next logical move should be, now that the company is determined to adhere to the 1923 resolution, to petition the legislature to validate the action of last spring, namely, that the company be allowed to pay for its share of the Richmond, Biscove and Stanley street pavements in ten annual instalments. Failing this, there can be but one recourse—enter legal action against the company and collect with a judgment from the supreme court. City Clerk Sam Baker was directed yesterday to make provision in the City of London bill for this permission. In the meanwhile Sir Adam Beck, M. L. A. for London, will be asked to support the move and assist the municipality in every respect, while the question is before the house. City Solicitor T. G. Meredith and Mayor George Wenige were also instructed to journey to the provincial capital before the bill is presented to further the city's interests. Opinion was sharply divided yesterday as to the best means of tackling the problem. Ald. Harry Bottrell felt that the 1923 aldermen had got themselves into a "fix" and the chief issue now was to find the best way to get out of it. He reasoned that they should make the company

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Yukon Enjoys Zero Weather

Dawson City, Yukon Territory, Jan. 22.—The Yukon is experiencing the mildest weather in the memory of the oldest inhabitant. This month the thermometer has hovered around zero daily as contrasted with previous Januaries, when it ran the gamut between 40 and 70 below. High temperatures have prevailed in the Yukon since early last summer.

The theory advanced by meteorologists that the warmer weather is due to higher temperatures in the Pacific Ocean currents, possibly due to submarine and volcanic disturbances is indorsed.

He added that there had been considerable legislation of late years affecting the company in a general way, unforeseen at the inception of by-law 916, and that the Ontario Railway Board's ruling a few years ago, whereby wages were elevated.

After a long conversation with Mr. Ivey, the mayor and his associates realized that the best the company had to offer was a strict application of last year's resolution, they adjourned.

Those who attended were: Mayor Wenige, Ald. Douglass, Ald. Greer, City Clerk Baker and City Treasurer Bell and Mr. Ivey.

MINERS' COMPANY RESUME PARLEY

Both Sides in Nova Scotia Dispute Anxious For Settlement.

Sydney, N. S., Jan. 22.—Negotiations with a view to agreement upon a wage contract were resumed today between representatives of the United Mine Workers and the British Empire Steel Corporation. Both sides expressed their sincere desire to reach an agreement.

A sub-committee was appointed with instructions to continue in session until a basis of agreement was arrived at, and it was mutually agreed that adjournment of the conference should take place only by joint desire.

The committee is composed of Messrs. Barrett, Baxter, Dalrymple and Houston, representing the United Mine Workers of America, and the resident heads of the corporation, namely, Vice-President J. E. McLurg, H. J. McCann, assistant general manager of the Dominion Coal Company; A. S. McNell, in charge of all operations of the company, and F. W. Gray, assistant to the vice-president.

The committee went into session immediately upon appointment.

GIVEN SENTENCE OF FIFTEEN YEARS

Walter Bennett Found Guilty On a Charge of Man-slaughter.

Windsor, Jan. 22.—Walter Bennett, 27 years old, veteran of the Great War, who was found guilty of manslaughter by a jury at Sandwich last week, this afternoon was sentenced to 15 years' imprisonment by Justice Wright. Bennett, the jury found, slew Herbert Bennetto, his landlord, at Ford, on the night of Nov. 16, using a piece of two by four lumber.

On the witness stand Bennett admitted improper relations with Bennetto's wife. This led to a quarrel, ending in the slaying, it is alleged.

Sentence Suspended.

Jacob Campbell, 32 years old, conductor of the Essex Interurban, which caused the death of Motorman Orlando Wigle in a collision near Windsor, this afternoon was found not guilty of manslaughter.

Edward Couvra, Windsor youth, was sentenced to the Ontario reformatory for an indeterminate term, not to exceed two years. He was charged with rape, but the jury brought in a verdict of guilty on an indictment for indecent assault and supplying liquor to a minor.

CITY COUNCIL WILL LEND SUPPORT TO KNOLLWOOD PARK

Promise Aid To Secure Street Railway Accommodation For Residents.

MAYOR WENIGE SPEAKS

Mayor George Wenige and several members of the city council promised to lend their support to the efforts of the Knollwood Park Ratepayers' Association in the matter of securing street railway accommodation for that section of the city.

The meeting, held in Knollwood Park school last night was well attended, and the speakers were accorded a good hearing. As each finished, several questions were asked and answered, all revolving around the matter of either transportation or the railway crossing at Quebec street.

J. H. Wade, president of the association, occupied the chair, and in a few words stated the purpose of the association was to assist the council by individual effort, and to improve Knollwood Park. He said that in the matter of transportation the residents were glad to have the bus line, but that it was a defective system. He declared that if the council granted the street railway a 5-year extension of their franchise, the company in turn should make some extension.

Real Way To Progress.

Stating that community meetings were the real way to progress, Mayor Wenige said that the council would endeavor to give all the improvements asked, and at the same time, keep the tax rate down. Referring to the statement that a bus was contrived, he said that the time was coming when buses would serve instead of street cars.

As soon as we get this petty squabble settled we will get somewhere," he continued. "The papers are making a lot of it, but it is really a trifling matter. Had the paving not been done the city might have been liable for damages amounting to \$50,000 for faulty roads. I am satisfied that the railway is contemplated, and that providing the franchise is granted."

Referring to water and light, the mayor stated that owing to provincial legislation the utilities commission would not grant services unless it was guaranteed that the return would be 10 per cent on the investment. He declared that every demand that came within this clause had been met.

Dominion Railway Board.

He reported that the matter of the crossing of the C. P. R. at Quebec street was in the hands of the Dominion Railway Board. He urged the association to send their requests to the council and they would get action. He promised his support for additional transportation for the district.

Mr. Wade here stated that the bus had nearly been struck by a train last Saturday owing to there being no alarm at the crossing.

Ald. Hayden promised to look after the interests of the ratepayers, as did Aldermen Walsh, Bottrell, Greer and Shaw. Ald. Ed Smith suggested that the logical extension for the street railway was east on Dundas to McCormick Boulevard and then south on Quebec to Dundas street. He promised to support the needs of Knollwood Park.

GRAIN SHIP FOR CANADA LAUNCHED AT LONDON

Built For Eastern Steamship Company To Run On Great Lakes.

London, Jan. 22.—Built to the order of the Eastern Steamship Company of Canada, the steamer Norman P. Clement, sister ship of the Judge Hart, which was launched last year by the same firm, was launched this week from the yards of Messrs. John Samuel White & Company at East Cowes.

The vessel, which is of 2,500 tons deadweight, is one of a batch of ten ordered from British firms by the Eastern Steamship Company for the grain-carrying trade on the Great Lakes and the St. Lawrence River.

NEW YORK MEN WANT C. N. R. LOAN

Think Thornton Anxious To Secure Bids of Wall Street Bankers.

New York, Jan. 22.—The New York Tribune understands that Sir Henry Thornton, president of the C. N. R., was in the financial district today, discussing financial affairs with bankers "and their probable bid for the \$50,000,000 C. N. R. loan," for which tenders will open tomorrow.

The Tribune says New York financial men are particularly anxious to obtain the loan for this market, "but, unless the limitations of the Dominion may cause the group to put in a lower bid than would otherwise be the case, it is feared, that the business will be handled internationally."

"The C. N. R. have not borrowed in New York since 1922, although it was generally expected that they would come here to meet their 1923 requirements. The sale of \$27,500,000 equipment certificates, which to the surprise of the local banking fraternity, was successfully accomplished at home, proved to be the only financing undertaken by the system last year."

Baldwin's Naval Program Divulged

Called For Building of 52 Cruisers Instead of 25, As Recorded.

London, Jan. 22.—The naval construction program which the Baldwin government intended to put forward had it continued in office as outlined by Lt.-Col. Amery, first lord of the admiralty, in the House of Commons last evening, called for, among other measures, the laying down in the next decade of some 52 cruisers, instead of 25, as erroneously recorded by a parliamentary reporter, and thus given out, it developed today.

Col. Amery said this program was "put forward with a view to relieving the unemployment situation in the great shipbuilding centers," and he had every confidence that the new government would "give these proposals of ours prompt and sympathetic consideration with a view to taking action in the House as soon as we reassemble."

WEE LAD GUILTY OF FALSE ALARM
