Presence of Government

Colon, Nov. 4.—With
shot and amid scene

was declared last evening that Panama is now in the hands of the revolutionists and no communication has been made to receive news from the Colombian gunboat Bolivar which is in the harbor after the declaration of independence and threat to the city without doing damage to life or property. In the absence of order prevails, and the isthmus is running into anarchy and confusion. In Panama the new republic floats on the ruins of the old government buildings.
