FIFTEENTH YEAR

\$50,000 FOR TORONTO HARBOR

THE SUPPLEMENTARY ESTIMATES BROUGHT DOWN LAST NIGHT.

Headed This \$50,000 Will Be Spent On Government Buildings In The City.

\$100 For A Monument to the North-west Volunteers - Tarz's strange Charge Against Quebec Judiciary.

OTTAWA, July 12.—On the opening of the House to-day Hon. Mr. Foster moved the third reading of the bill ratifying the French treaty, which was carried without dissent.

The resolution granting a subsidy of \$750,000 a year for ten years for the establishment of a fast Atlantic service was concurred in and a bill based on it was introduced by Mr. Foster and read a third time.

Mr. Girouard (Jacques Cartier), from the committee on privileges and elections, presented the report and evidence in the Toronto case. On motion of Sir John Thompson He agreed to consider the report to-morrow.

Tar's Charges Against Quebec Judiciary. On motion to go into committee of ways and means, Mr. Tarz made his usual talk of charges against the Quebec Judiciary, which after all proved to be nothing serious for stripped of its state and useful and serious insinuations they simply amounted to this, that in Mr. Tarz's opinion Judge Beaudette was a bad jurist and his decisions were given whatever of any such decisions was given. He also charged Judges Teller and Oulmes with charging too many expenses which they were not entitled to; this was only Mr. Tarz's opinion and he produced no proof whatever to support his assertions.

The Premier Defends the Bench. Sir John Thompson vigorously defended the honor and dignity of the bench and deprecated the unmanly manner in which Mr. Tarz had made his charges. There was not one iota of proof of any of the vague assertions Mr. Tarz had made, and it was to be regretted that the honor of the judges should be attacked in such a loose manner.

Sir John said that he had received communications from Judges Beaudette and Davidson denying most emphatically Mr. Tarz's assertions and asking the fullest investigation. Of this and the irregular manner in which Mr. Tarz had proceeded he would take a little time before stating how he thought the House should deal with the matter.

Laurier Does Not Endorse Tarz. Mr. Laurier spoke now to 6 o'clock and for a short time after. He spoke of his having heard, apologetic manner, not exactly condemning Mr. Tarz's course, but not endorsing it, and saying he was sorry to see the judiciary of Quebec, the judges of which province, he said, were so high-minded and honorable as were to be found on the bench of any other province.

Solicitor-General Curran followed in a scathing attack upon Mr. Tarz. He said that gentlemen had attacked everything that was good and pure and noble, and had pursued the course of a mad dog, and that it was almost an honor to be denounced by him.

The Judges' Opinion Better Than Tarz's. Mr. Curran said that he had attended the trial of the case and had heard the judges and pointed out the traveling expenses which Mr. Tarz asserted had been improperly charged by Judges Beaudette and Teller were the same charges which other judges, such as those in Montreal, had been charged with in 1877. He said that he had heard the judges and he was sure that they were not legally entitled to, and their opinion as to the occasion of the trial was entitled to much better than Mr. Tarz's.

The debate was talked out by Messrs. Jeannotte, Amyot and Bellay, after which the House went into ways and means, passing the items of which notice was given last night.

The House then went into committee on the Insurance Bill. Mr. McCarthy, Sir John Thompson said the North-west bill would be gone on with on Monday. The House adjourned at 10.

McCarthy Would Unseat Toronto. Mr. McCarthy to-night gave notice of a very long amendment which he devoted most space and gave most quotations from the Toronto case which concludes as follows: "As your committee has already reported that in the opinion of your committee, Arthur Joseph Turzotte, Esq., holding office as a member of the House of Representatives, in which he was interested with Jean Baptiste Provost, and in others in which he was also interested, was guilty of offences contrary to and in violation of the Independence of Parliament Act, and that the House of Representatives should be dissolved and under the provisions of the said act rendered vacant from the time at which he first held any of the said offices with the Department of Militia."

Discrimination Against United States Steamship Lines. WASHINGTON, July 12.—George O. Glavin, attorney for Atlantic steamship lines running from New York to Europe, today opened before a sub-committee of the House of Representatives, and spoke of the discrimination which is in operation under the present law against the lines of ships to represent.

THE TARIFF CONFERENCE. House Conference adjourned to to-morrow.

WASHINGTON, July 12.—While the tariff conference are making progress, as they express it, it is obvious no definite conclusion can be reached in regard to the important schedules. It is understood Speaker Crisp has requested Mr. Montgomery to inform the other House conference members to make a check on the suggestion of compromise, except upon minor matters, must be approved by the representatives of both Houses.
