Professor C．F．Hodye，of Clark （niversity，Worcester，Massachusetts， has lieen making a number of experi－ ments as to the results of a diet of whisky on dogs．One of his ohjects Was to comprre the vigour and freedom from deformity of the young from both normal and alcoholic parents．The amount of alcohol given to the latter wiss not sufflient to produce intoxica－ tion．Both pairs of dogs under observation have produced three litters of pups up to date，and the resulis are given below：－
