Hon. Allan J. MacEachen (Minister of Manpower and Immigration): 1. (a) Average cost per trainee \$2,343 (Training cost \$1,811.20—Training Allowance \$531.82); (b) \$51,546.50 for 22 trainees starting the course.

- 3. 143—pilots in all categories, not necessarily "bush pilots". Many seasonally unemployed or not interested in moving to Northern Ontario.

- 5. Manpower counsellors keep in touch with the needs of the industry and contact employers on behalf of clients who are seeking new positions. Applications with details of the pilot's training, licence, endorsements, experience, flying hours, etc., are, when the client is interested, circulated to Canada Manpower Centres where opportunities might exist. Pilots who lack the training, experience or licences with the endorsements required by employers are helped to obtain other types of employment. Pilots who follow the occupation on a seasonal basis are also assisted with their search for alternative off-season employment.
- 6. The availability of the training and the and other projects in the field of air pollu selection criteria were broadcast by Radio A list of current projects is attached.

Stations CFTA, CKPR and CJLX, Television Station CKPR-TV and published in the Port Arthur News Chronicle and the Fort William Times Journal, to attract potential trainees who would be suitable for "bush flying" operations.

The criteria were: Valid private pilot licence-minimum requirement; Medical category to Commercial Pilot standard; Academic standing-functional Grade 10 (determined by mature adult test) or higher; Suggested age 35 or under. Actual decision made on the basis of experience or physical ability to handle "bush pilot" position which includes loading and unloading freight; Flight test; Motivation and definite willingness to accept employment in bush operations in Northern Ontario. 8. Twenty-two pilots commenced the course and 13 of the 20 graduates obtained employment with nine employers in Northern Ontario. The salaries of the 13 were as follows; one pilot, \$250 per month plus four cents per mile; four pilots, \$250 per month plus three cents per mile; 1 pilot, \$10 per day plus four cents per mile; 1 pilot, \$500 per month; four pilots, \$400 per month; one pilot, \$300 per month plus room and board; earnings of one pilot unknown.
