My dear Mr. Principal :-

With further reference to my letter to you of yesterday's date, I wish to state that I omitted to refer to the concluding paragraph of your letter of the 10th instant. I quite agree with you, that a petition would carry much more weight "if endorsed by the Law Faculties of the Universities, rather than as a petition from a Student body". I may say, that I have discussed this whole matter on more occasions than one with the Dean of the Law Faculty of the University of Montreal, with a view to a united action. He did not, however, see his way to move at the present time. Had he consented, I would have at once brought the matter u p before our Faculty. I may tell you that I consider the petition as but a very thin end of the wedge. My hope is, sometime, to have our degree of B.C.L. accepted as an Admission to Practice, without further examination. You will understand that where students do not go forward to the degree of B.C.L. at our University, but follow an office for five years, an examination must take place.
