Jockey Club Makes Announcement as Result of Recent Court Decision.

NEW YORK, Feb. 26.—From the wording of a statement issued after meetings today of the stewards of the Jockey Club and of officials of several of the racing associations, the impression prevails among racing men tonight that the powers that govern horse-racing in this vicinity have about decided to open some of the tracks in the metropolitan district during the coming season. The way is held to have been paved for such action, should it be taken, by a recent court decision holding oral betting not unlawful, thereby exempting directors of racing associations from liability under the law for betting in this form. Although all the racing associations were not represented, because of the absence from the city of the officials of the Empire City, Brighton Beach and Jamaica race tracks, no definite conclusion was announced as to whether racing would be resumed. That such is the intention, however, could be inferred from the statement, made after the meeting, that owing to the great reduction in the number of horses racing, and the definite program announced by the Virginia and Maryland associations, which have already secured approval from the Jockey Club, those spring meetings will not be conducted.

The view taken by those interested, after this official notice was read, was that, at the conclusion of racing in Virginia and Maryland, about May 20, some of the New York racing associations and clubs would decide to reopen their race courses and hold meetings under licenses from the state racing commission and the approval of the Jockey Club. In a statement issued by the stewards of the Jockey Club today, after they had declared that the Jockey Club is only a supervisory body and does not control the business policy of any of the racing associations, it is not in its province to say whether there shall or shall not be racing. It was pointed out, but should any of the associations decide to open their race courses the Jockey Club controls the manner in which such racing shall be conducted. Chairman August Belmont presided at the meeting of the Jockey Club stewards, during which F. K. Sturges was elected vice-chairman in the place of the late James R. Keene, and H. K. Knapp was elected secretary and treasurer, the offices formerly held by F. K. Sturges. The only steward absent was F. R. Hitchcock, who is now in Alken, S.C. The vacancy caused by the death of James R. Keene remains unfilled.

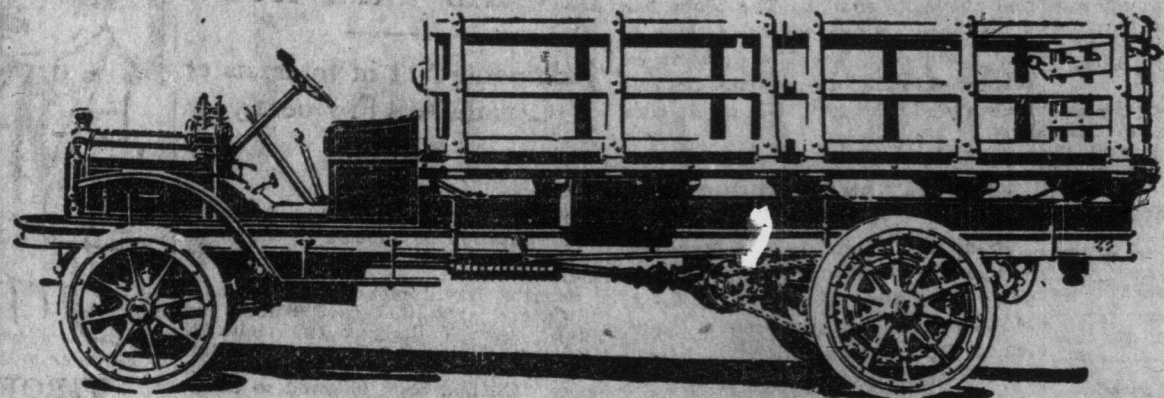
LAKEVIEW LOSE TROPHY.

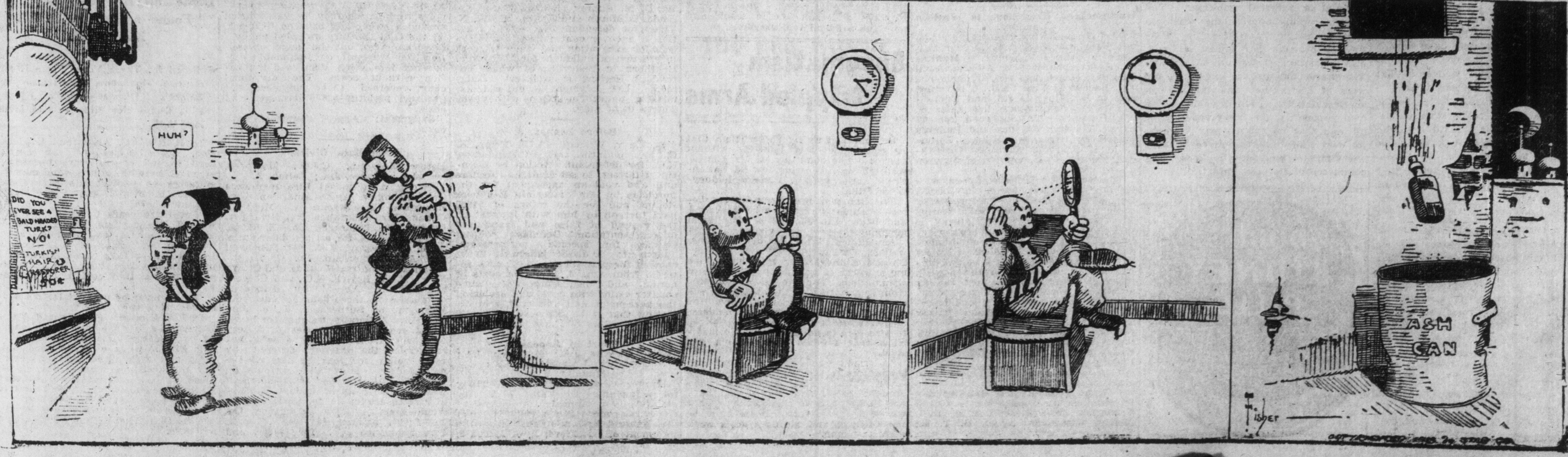
