The sommittee of business men who had the

task of framing a bankruptcy bill met 19 times, and succeeded in framing one which met the views of all the boards of trade throughout the country. It was urged upon the Government that some such measure was urgently needed. The fact that failures through fraud increased from 1 per cent. in 1890 to over 5 per cent. in 1892 should be conclusive proof that our bankruptcy laws are wholly ineffectual, and shows the crying need for a proper measure. It is hard to understand why so much of the time of Parliament is taken up with personal squabbles while the great business of the country is neglected.
