

LEMBERG ENTERED BY TEUTON ARMIES

Russians Got Supplies Safely
Away Before Evacuating
Position.

RESISTED EVERY STEP
Attacked Austro-Germans on
Both Flanks, Gaining
Successes.

LONDON, June 23.—The expected
evacuation of Lemberg by the Russians
and its entry by the Austrians are re-
ported today from Berlin and Vienna.
The Russians fought a rear guard
action and left a small garrison to de-
lay the advance of the enemy, which
was in three columns by an enveloping
movement, one striking for the Rus-
sian centre, the other encircling the
position from the north and the other
occupying the position from the south,
by occupying the Town of Sezeretz, 20
miles to the southwest.

The Russians countered by winning
victories on both flanks of the Teuton
armies.

The Russians began the withdrawal
of their troops and supplies from Lem-
berg Monday and they left fewer than
40,000 men to defend the city. These
held up the advance of the enemy for
a sufficient time to enable the rest of
the army to effect a safe withdrawal to
the Russian border.

The possession of this city, which
has no good defensive positions, was of
little military value, and a stand
here at the present juncture would in-
volve heavy losses by the Russians. It
is admitted that the Russians lack
supplies and equipment. This short-
age is in a fair way to being remedied,
but nevertheless it may be some time
before the Russians are ready to
make a vigorous offensive.

LOUGHEED TO ACT AS MINISTER OF MILITIA

OTTAWA, June 23.—It is understood
that Hon. J. A. Lougheed, government
leader in the senate, will be acting
minister of militia during General
Hughes' absence in England. He has
arrived in the city.

ZEPPELINS DESTROYED ARSENAL IN ENGLAND?

Berlin Claims South Shields Plant
Suffered in Recent
Raid.

BERLIN, via wireless to Sayville.—
The Overseas News Agency today
gave out the following:
"A message from Christiania says
that the steamer Iotum, which has
arrived at Stavanger, reports that
several zeppelins, on the night between
Tuesday and Wednesday (probably
June 15-16), dropped many bombs on
the Armstrong works at South Shields,
England, which destroyed the navy
yards and arsenal. Several buildings
were destroyed. The damage was enor-
mous. Seventeen persons were killed
and 40 injured."

The foregoing evidently refers to
the raid of zeppelins on the northeast
coast of England last week. Tuesday
night. The British censorship pre-
vented the publication of details of
this raid.

Shields, on the bank of the Tyne,
has vast docks and is a great seat of
the shipbuilding and auxiliary in-
dustries. The Armstrong works are
at Elswick Yard, near Shields.

The Armstrong Company, in addi-
tion to its shipbuilding yards, has ex-
tensive ordnance works and steel
works. The company employed 25,000
men before the war.

"Near Berry-au-Bac at Hill 108 was
exploded a mine which caused an ex-
cavation measuring 35 metres in di-
ameter and very seriously damaged the
German trenches.

"In Champagne, on the Perthes-
Beaunejour front, an action by means
of mines occurred, and a violent can-
nonade.

"On the heights of the Meuse at the
Calonne trench the enemy this morn-
ing delivered a violent counter-attack,
which enabled him to retake his for-
mer second line. In the course of the
afternoon a new German attack was
started; it was immediately checked.
"Taking in our turn the offensive,
we regained a foothold in the second
line of the enemy.

"In the outskirts of Le Pretre forest
the enemy bombarded in a particularly
intense fashion our positions in the
"Quart en Reserve."

"In Lorraine we have occupied two
works near Leintrey. We took some
prisoners, among them three officers.
"In the Vosges storms and a thick
fog prevail."

HON. DR. PYNE DEPARTS.

Hon. Dr. Pyne left for England yes-
terday morning, accompanied by Mrs.
Pyne and his private secretary, Clark-
son James. A United Empire Loyali-
sts' deputation saw them off at the
station, and presented Mrs. Pyne with
a bouquet of flowers. Dr. Pyne's stay
will be for an indefinite period.

VIENNA, via Berlin wireless, June
23.—The war office today confirmed
reports that Austrian warships bom-
barded Fano and other Italian towns
June 18, sinking an Italian steamer.

Rome despatches on June 18 car-
ried details of the bombardment of
Fano and the sinking of an Italian
vessel.

FRENCH CHECKED GERMAN ATTACK

Then Regained a Foothold in
the Enemy's Second
Line.

TWO WORKS OCCURRED
Some Prisoners Were Taken,
Among Them Being Three
Officers.

PARIS, June 23.—The following
official communication on the progress
of the campaign in the western area
was issued by the war office tonight:
"In the region to the north of Arras
nothing was reported today except
several infantry actions. To the north
of Souchez we made slight progress
and repulsed a German counter-at-
tack. The cannonade has not ceased
in the sector between Angres and
Ecurie.
