

THEY'RE OFF IN SALES CLUB RACE FOR \$16,000 IN PRIZES

First Published List of Standings in World's Big Circulation Campaign Shows That There Is Still Room for Many New Members—Especially Good Opportunity for Out-of-City Entries.

Two \$500 Extra Prizes.

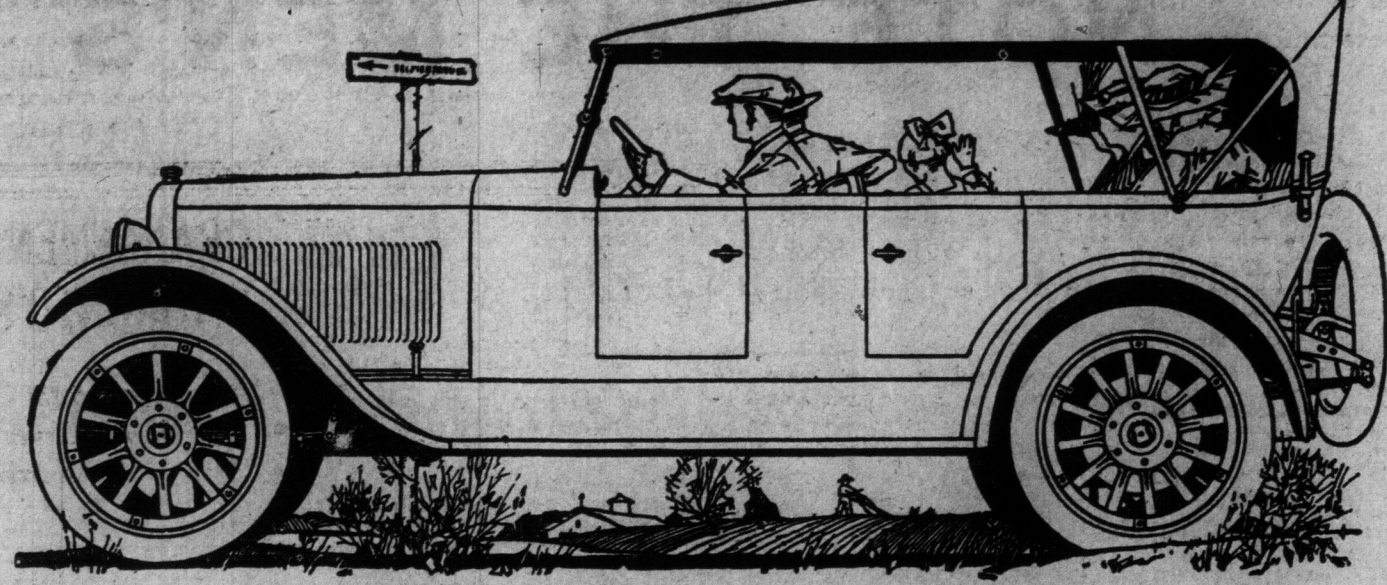

FORTY YEARS' WORK EARNS PENSION

Teachers' Salaries and Allowances Increased Considerably Since 1909.

From some pension memoranda now being prepared in the Ontario education department it is shown that the salaries of the teachers throughout the province have increased a little over 50 per cent. during the last ten years.

Another interesting item developed was that a lady of 77 years of age is at present teaching school at Aylmer, she having been born in 1842. Ten years ago the veteran teacher was receiving \$400 per annum. She now gets \$450, and is about to retire on a pension of \$865 a year, the latter being the minimum retiring allowance for teachers in the province.

There are also cases of teachers who are getting the \$865 pension under an act which never received that amount per annum in their experience. The salaries, of course, vary largely, according to the status of the school.

The pensions run from \$365 to \$1,000 a year for 40 years' service, and are governed in different ways. The time of service before a pension can be awarded varies from 15 to 50 years, and there are many cases in which more than the half century has been spent by men and women in the profession. No pension is given for less than 16 years, and even then only on account of incapacity.

A teacher who is not incapacitated but who has served under 30 and 40 years, receives an allowance which is designated as actuarial, or almost equivalent to a full pension. The full sum is only payable for forty or more years' service.

Defective Record System.

At present 164 cases for pension are being considered under the new act, and more are to be considered by the education department on Monday next. All the records of the applicants require to be verified. In not a few cases of the older teachers the records are lost, and this is attributed to the bad system in vogue in the department some forty years ago. The records branch today leaves nothing to be desired.

EMPLOYMENT AGENCIES DECREASED BY HALF

Hon. F. Macdonald, minister of public works, announced yesterday that the government had decided to cut by practically one-half the number of private employment agencies throughout the province, adding: "The licenses of the private employment agencies expire on July 15. Under the legislation asked last session, the government is limiting the number of private employment bureaus which will be allowed to operate in the different municipalities throughout the province. The agencies to be retained are being selected and notices will be sent to them to that effect within a few days."

The Ontario railway board has been asked to take some action to bring about a resumption of a service on the Sandwich, Windsor & Amherstburg Railway, where the men are on strike. D. M. McIntyre said yesterday that the board was considering the matter.

LAW'S LONG MEMORY.

Nine months ago, Charles White, alias James Haines, was arrested charged with forging a soldier's cheque for \$54.10. At the time of the arrest White was released on bail and he disappeared. He was recently arrested on the warrant dated back six months, and yesterday morning Magistrate Kingsford found him guilty and sentenced White to 30 days in jail. White denied that he had ever gone under the name of Haines.
